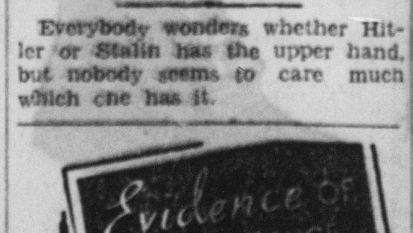

County Blanketed Under 8-inch Snow

If the first snow to fall in Centre County this season can be taken as an indication, we're due for a real old-fashioned winter.

Snow which began Saturday night and continued most of the night and throughout a part of Sunday, blanketed the county with eight-inches of heavy, wet snow.

Driving was made doubly hazardous Saturday night because the fast-falling flakes obscured vision, and the wet slushy blanket over the road made it difficult to keep a car under control.

As a result, a number of motor accidents, most of them of a minor nature, were reported. The Highway department, caught unawares by the sudden and severe storm, rushed equipment into readiness, and some of the mountain roads were cleared with snowplows. Ashes were spread on other roads to prevent mishaps. Although none of the highway snow fences have been erected at this time they were not needed, since the weekend snow was heavy and there was not sufficient wind to cause drifting. Rising temperatures, Monday cleared away the snow.
