CELERY GROWERS HAVE MARKET ORGANIZATION

A unique marketing program is being followed for the second year by a group of celery growers near Philadelphia. The program is being developed by the growers in cooperation with H. B. Donaldson, extension marketing specialist, from the Pennsylvania State College, and C. K. Hollowell, county agricultural agent.

Definite grades conforming generally to the U. S. standard grade requirements for celery have been set up by the growers' organization. All celery meeting specified requirements is sold under the brand and label of the organization.

This year the organization will handle approximately 4,000 crates of celery, representing the crop from more than 125 acres. "Sweet Nut" brand celery, the highest quality crop, in addition to being sold in the Philadelphia area, will go to New York and to points several hundred miles west of the producing area.
