A traffic accident that took the life of the Rev. J. F. McClellan last week at DuBois was blamed for another death. The 63-year-old retired minister's widow, an invalid for months, died of shock last Wednesday, a few hours after his burial. Mr. McClellan was killed while helping a neighbor's son to cross a street. Mrs. Elda Spotts McClellan was a daughter of David and Catherine Spotts, pioneer Bald Eagle Valley residents, and was born at Unionville on December 19, 1871. She was united in marriage to the Rev. James McClellan in 1916. Surviving are a brother and sister, Sherman L. Spotts, of North Chid, N. Y., and Minnie Davidson, of Kane. Funeral services were held Friday afternoon in the Free Methodist church, Fleming, with the Rev. R. R. Blevins and Rev. G. J. Kelley officiating. Interment was made in the Bush Hollow cemetery.

The proposed ordinance will prevent certain industries from locating within the borough limits which might be objectionable because of odor, noise, fumes, dust, etc. It sets forth certain restrictions for the construction of residences, as to the building lines and the percentage of lot area for buildings. The locations are also limited for gas service stations. Building permits will be required for all new buildings as well as for certain repairs, reconstruction, etc.
