See Farm Security Boon To Farmers

More and more Centre county farm families who are borrowers of the Farm Security Administration are learning to provide for most of their subsistence needs on their farms. It was announced by Oakley S. Havens, FSA Rural Rehabilitation Supervisor here, following a round of visits to these families.

The supervisors found that practically all of the families taking part in the Farm Security program of supervised credit have assured themselves of a good table throughout the winter by extensively canning and storing vegetables and fruits raised in their own gardens and by keeping cows, chickens and pigs. They will have an abundance of pork for the winter, and the large majority of the families have at least one brood sow to furnish the family with pigs for fattening and for sale. Many are also churning butter, and making cheese for their own use - and in some cases for sale as well.

Mrs. Leah G. Snyder, Home Management Supervisor here, is in charge of the home management and family subsistence program. Special attention has been devoted to these families to the growing of feed for their livestock. The few failures to do this were ascribed by Mr. Havens to adverse weather conditions.

"The well-being of a farm family cannot be measured by cash income alone," Mr. Havens declared. "The money a family saves by producing its own food and feed for the livestock becomes available for operating needs, for clothing and other things, as well as for paying their debts. That is why a live-at-home program is such an important feature of the management plan which are worked out in connection with our loans. Although this has been a difficult year for many farmers, it is obvious that the great majority of our borrowers who are producing their food and feed on their farms have come through in far better condition than those who are buying their supplies."

"The Rehabilitation loans are made," Mr. Havens added, "to farm operators who are unable to obtain financial assistance from other public or private sources. The Farm Security Administration, not primarily a credit agency, is able to make such loans only when we can draw up workable farm and home management plans with the farmer and his wife. In other words, both the farm family and the farm itself must show reasonable likelihood of being able to support the family and repay the loan over a reasonable period of time, through our financial supervision. The high rate of repayments," Mr. Havens concluded, "bear out our faith in these 'character loans.'"

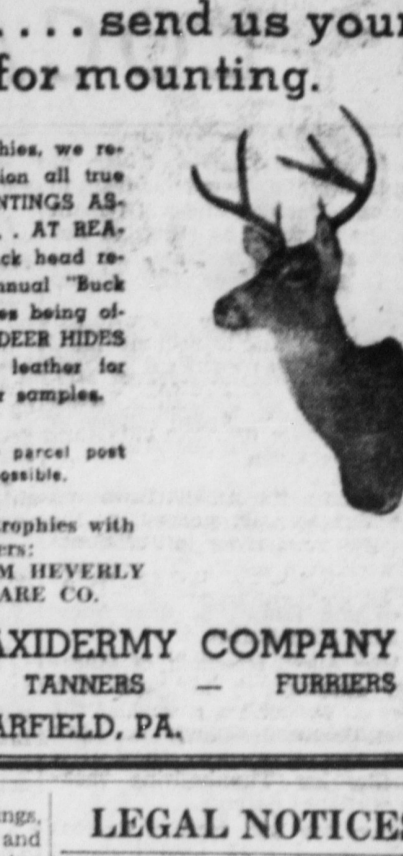
