

OBITUARY

ALBERT MOOREHEAD.

Albert Moorehead, 84-year-old Port Matilda resident who made his home with his daughter, Hattie, Mrs. William Arnold, died at her Osceola Mills home at 4:30 o'clock Saturday morning. The deceased was born February 3, 1845 in Blair county. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Moorehead. One daughter, at whose home he died, and one sister, Mrs. Emma Walters, of Shelby, Ohio, survive him. Funeral services were held from the William Arnold home, in Osceola Mills, Tuesday afternoon with Rev. M. H. Crawford officiating. Interment was made in the Umbria cemetery at Osceola Mills.

WILLIAM D. CROUSE

William Downing Crouse, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. Domes S. Crouse, of Lockport, Clinton county, died Tuesday afternoon, November 21, at the Lock Haven hospital after an illness of one week suffering from complications. Born at Smallton, Centre county, he had lived in Clinton county for 10 years. He was a member of the First Evangelical Sunday school, Lock Haven, and prior to his death was the first time he had missed for two years. He is survived by his parents, one brother, Domes, Jr., and one sister, Betty, at home. Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the parents' home, with the Rev. Homer W. Heisley, pastor of the First Evangelical church, Lock Haven, officiating. Burial was made in Dunstons cemetery.

MRS. CLAIR E. GRUBB.

Mrs. Mabel Grubb, wife of Clair E. Grubb, of Stow, Ohio, a native of Centre county, died at her home in Ohio on Tuesday morning of last week. A daughter of the late Benner and Viola White Walker, she was born at Pine Glen, this county, on February 6, 1877, making her age at time of death 42 years, 9 months and 15 days. During her childhood the family moved to Centre Hall, and later to Houserville. On Christmas Day, 1915, she was united in marriage with Clair E. Grubb, of Nitzany, and they moved to Akron, Ohio. Surviving are the husband, one son, Glenn, at home, and four brothers, namely: Frank L. Walker, Spring Mills; Alfred H. Walker, Boolsburg; and Kearney C. Walker, of Lemont. Funeral services were held last Thursday, with interment in Rose Hill cemetery, Akron, Ohio.

MRS. GERALD RISHEL.

Mrs. Mary Rishel, wife of Gerald Rishel, of Boolsburg, passed away at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon at the home of her parents, Ammon J. and Carrie Roush Hazel, at Boolsburg, after a six months' illness with a complication of diseases. Mrs. Rishel was born at Madisonburg on September 30, 1892, making her age at time of death 37 years, 1 month and 24 days. On July 15, 1921, she was united in marriage with Gerald Rishel, who survives with the following children: Gerald E. J. John L. G. and Robert J. G. all at home. Also surviving are her parents and these sisters: Mrs. Charles Faxon, of Boolsburg; Mrs. Charles W. Maxwell, of Ellinger, Pa.; Mrs. Gladys Hazel, of Glasgow, N. J.; and Jane Hazel, of Boolsburg. Funeral services were held on Monday afternoon at the home of her parents in Boolsburg, with the Rev. A. S. Asendorf, of State College Reformed church, officiating. Interment was made in the Boolsburg cemetery.

ROBERT B. J. MOORE

Robert Birmouth Johnson Moore, widely-known Hilltop country stockman and farmer and a member of the family for which Mooreville was named, died at his home in Aitch, Sunday morning at 7:55 o'clock of diseases incident to advanced age after a two years' illness. His death has broken one of the few remaining links connecting the post-Civil War, horse and buggy age and the present stream-lined generations. Mr. Moore led an active life until 1927, operating a farm close to Marklesburg, Huntingdon county. Failing health forced him to retire several weeks ago and he moved into the village of Aitch. A son of Luther William and Mary Jane Johnson Moore, Mr. Moore descended from one of Shavers Creek Valley's oldest foundation families. He was born in Marklesburg borough January 14, 1867. Not long afterwards his parents moved to the Mooreville community and he grew to manhood on the Moore farm, near this village, now owned by a nephew, W. Gregory Moore. He attended the public schools at Mooreville. His father, Luther William Moore, died in 1875 when he was only nine years old. He took up farming when quite young, exhibiting particular interest in horses. Mr. Moore's long suit as a stockman was horses, possessing an uncanny knack at judging equines. Following his marriage to Miss Mary Stauffer he operated a farm near the Bethel church in Shavers Creek Valley for some time. After her death in 1905 he moved to Houserville, later locating in Altoona, where he was united in marriage with Mrs. Blanche Hite Hamilton. Shortly before the last World War he again operated a farm in Shavers Creek Valley and nineteen years ago moved to Woodcock Valley. For a number of years Mr. Moore conducted a mail route in that district, later taking up farming. One son, Paul Miller Moore, born to the first marriage, resides at Marklesburg, Pa. To the second marriage were born two sons, Hester Arthur and John Sheridan Moore, the former residing in Aitch and the latter with Paul Miller Moore, near Marklesburg. The widow, Blanche Hamilton Moore, also survives, as do four grandchildren. His only brother, William Sheridan Moore, died in 1925. In early life he joined the Mooreville Methodist Episcopal church. Burial services were con-

ducted at his late home in Aitch Wednesday at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon. The cortege then proceeded to Temple's Funeral Parlors, Petersburg, where obsequies were held at 3 o'clock. Mr. Moore's body was laid to rest in the ancestral plot in the Mooreville cemetery. Rev. Paul Rowland officiated.

CHARLES T. MITMAN

Charles T. Mitman, father of Mrs. Raymond Miller, State College, died suddenly at his home in Williamsport, Thursday night, of a heart attack. Mr. Mitman, who was 62 years of age, had dined at the home of his brother earlier in the day but returned home feeling well. He was stricken shortly after retiring for the night. He had operated a delicatessen stand in the Growers' Market since its opening.

MRS. ARTHUR S. HURRELL

Mrs. M. Winifred Hurrell, wife of Dr. Arthur S. Hurrell, director of education extension at Penn State College, died at her home on Ridge avenue, State College, at 3:45 o'clock Monday morning after a week's illness with a heart condition. Mrs. Hurrell is a daughter of Alvin and Sara Mallard Toles and was born at Middletown, Va., on November 14, 1876, making her age at time of death 53 years and 13 days. She is survived by her husband, Mrs. Hurrell was a member of St. Andrew's Episcopal church, State College. Funeral services were held Tuesday night at the home, with Canon Edward M. Frear officiating. The remains were taken yesterday to Buffalo, N. Y., for interment.

JOSEPH W. BROOKS

Joseph W. Brooks, former resident of Centre Hall, died at his home in Cleveland, Ohio, Sunday morning after a year's illness with a complication of diseases. Mr. Brooks, for many years a railroad man, was a son of William and Mary Gross Brooks and was born at Pleasant Gap 60 years ago. He is survived by his wife, the former Annie Carper, native of Linden Hall, and a daughter, Mrs. Richard Christian of Cleveland, Ohio. An only son, Russell, died in February of this year. Surviving brothers and sisters are: Mrs. P. V. Jodon, Coleville; Guy, Lee, Emmett, and Mrs. Ruth Blazer, all of Centre Hall; Mrs. Hugh Ralston, State College; and Mrs. A. S. Fleck, of Albuquerque, N. M. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the home in Cleveland, with interment in that city.

BURT BEIGHTOL

Burt Beightol, well known resident of Pine Glen, and retired lumberman, died at his home at 9:30 o'clock Monday night after an illness with a complication of diseases incident to advanced age. Mr. Beightol was a son of Daniel and Catherine Womser Beightol and was born at Moshannon on October 18, 1858, making his age at time of death 71 years, 1 month and 9 days. On October 2, 1880, he was united in marriage, his wife, Sara, surviving with one daughter, Mrs. L. L. Applin, of Rochester, N. Y.; 5 grandchildren, and 2 great-grandchildren. Mr. Beightol was the last member of his immediate family. Funeral services will be held from the late home at 2 o'clock this Thursday afternoon, with the Rev. Mr. Shirley, pastor of the Pine Glen Methodist church, officiating. Interment will be made in the Askey cemetery. Mr. Beightol was a member of the Methodist church and attended services regularly until his health failed.

MRS. WALTER McCLELLAN

Mrs. Stella McClellan, wife of Walter McClellan and native of Bellefonte, died at 12:10 o'clock Tuesday morning at her home in Reedsville after a long illness with a complication of diseases. Mrs. McClellan had been in failing health since three years ago when she underwent a leg amputation because of a diabetic condition. She was a daughter of Samuel and Anna McMullin Gordon and was born in Bellefonte in July, 1864, hence was in her 66th year. She had resided in Reedsville since her marriage more than 25 years ago. Surviving, in addition to her husband, are these children: Mrs. Robert Rhone, Burnham; Mrs. Elsworth Shank, Frank, Charles, William and Helen, all at home. Also surviving are these brothers and sisters: Samuel Gordon, Williamsport; Mrs. W. Lee Jones, Milesburg; Robert Gordon, Reedsville; Mrs. Richard Hosband, Mrs. Joseph Waite, and Andrew and Paul Gordon, all of Bellefonte. Funeral services will be held at 2:30 o'clock this Thursday afternoon at the Reedsville Methodist church, with the Rev. Mr. Stevens officiating. Interment will be made at

Reedsville. Mrs. McClellan was affiliated with the Methodist church and took an active part in various branches of church work.
