CARE IN WASHING VELVET NECESSARY

Many of the new winter velvet materials will wash successfully if done carefully. The new cotton velvets, velveteens, corduroys, and chenilles, as well as some of the rayon and silk velvets take to soap-and-water baths if they are protected against rubbing, squeezing or wringing which mash and mar the pile of the fabric, says Miss Helen S. Butler, home economics extension representative of Centre county. The trick in washing velvet garments is to hold them on the wrong side and wash by dipping and lifting in thick mild lukewarm soapsuds. Rinse the same way in clear lukewarm water. Never wring or squeeze the water out. After rinsing, shake off the excess moisture or lay the garment between turkish towels for a few minutes. Hang the garment on a smooth wooden hanger to finish drying. When almost dry, brush the velvet to lift the pile. Always brush in the direction of the natural "lie" of the velvet. Velvet materials need no ironing.

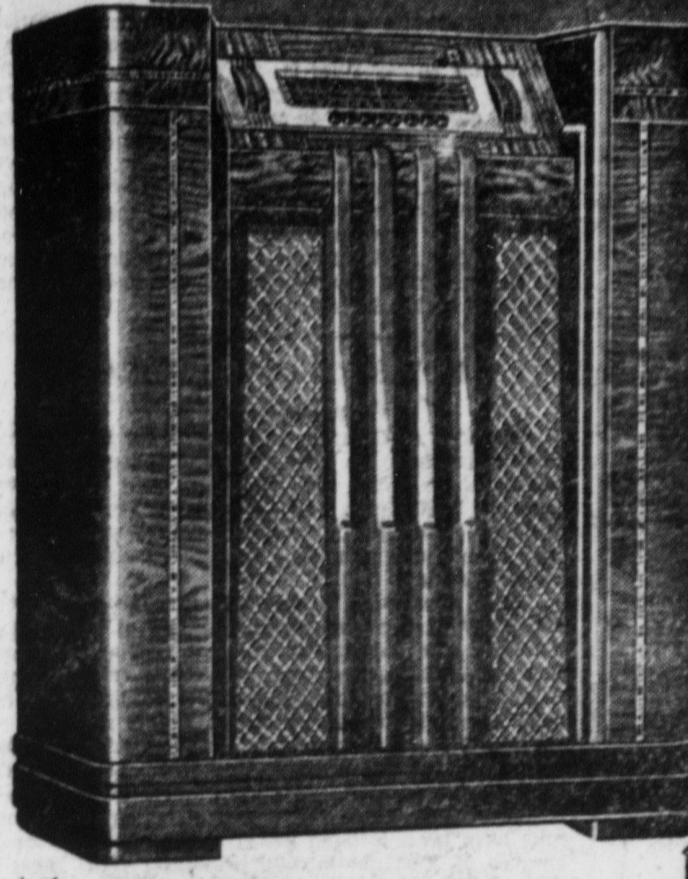
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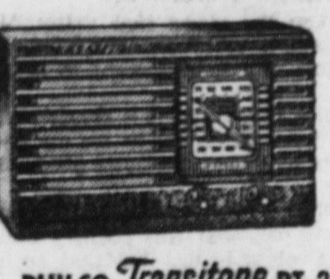


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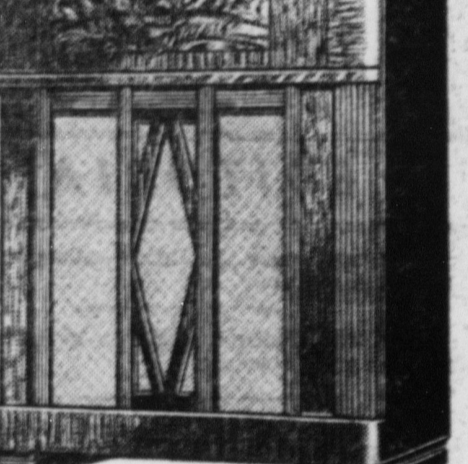

2200 ENROLLMENT IS REPORTED AT PENN STATE

A total first semester enrollment of 2200, greater by 207 than the all-time high of last year, has been reported by William S. Hoffman, Registrar of the Pennsylvania State College.

Included in this total are 512 graduate students and 124 special students on the campus, and 556 freshmen and sophomores at the five undergraduate centers maintained at Uniontown, DuBois, Pottsville, Hazleton and Altoona.

Highest enrollment among the College's 7 undergraduate schools is in the School of the Liberal Arts, with 973 men and 517 women, or a total of 1490. The totals for other schools are: Agriculture, 1260; Engineering, 1033; Education, 838; Chemistry and Physics, 644; Mineral Industries, 396; and Physical Education and Athletics, 178.

Mr. Hoffman's survey shows that the largest number of Penn State students are children of superintendents, managers and foremen in this occupational group are found 494 parents, while the second most numerous group is storekeepers and merchants, totaling 452. Farmers comprise the third highest group, 453.

In religious preference, 1113 students are Presbyterians, 1049 are Methodists, 936 Roman Catholics, 782 Lutherans, 543 Hebrew, 507 Reformed, 395 Protestant Episcopal, and 319 Baptists.
