Voluntary Confession Mrs. Dichl's hearing occurred after she had been taken over the route she said she followed June 20, the day her baby was born. She was in charge of District Attorney Burritt L. Haag, Private Wallace F. Ely of Williamsport, and Corporal W. G. Wagner, of Milton, both members of the State Motor Police. She made a full and voluntary confession of all the events leading up to and preceding the act on which the authorities have based a first degree murder charge. A charge of concealing the death of a child had previously been placed against her in Union county and she was released on bail.




