head by a stray bullet early in the season, was discharged from the County Hospital yesterday. Surgeons located the bullet in the forehead of his head, just back of the nose, but because of its position no attempt was made to remove the object.

Game Protector Samuel B. Reed, of Pine Grove Mills, declared that more deer were killed in his territory this year than in 1938. He commented upon the large racks.

Game Protector Joe Kistner, of Millheim, said that aside from day hunters, hunting activities in his area has been at a virtual standstill during the last week. Nearly all camps were vacated after the first week, he said.

John Meeker, forest ranger in the Seven Mountains, reported that most camps in that sector closed early in the season, and said that none of the camps got their limit of deer. Some had four and five, but none reached a perfect score of six.

Forest Ranger Stewart Benner, of Woodward, reported that the largest buck taken in that area was shot by Stewart Eisenman. The deer had 10 points and weighed 178 pounds hog-dressed. Mr. Benner had a complete list of deer killed in his section, but owing to defective telephone connection many of the names could not be determined. Mr. Benner said that four illegally killed doe and a spike buck were found in that area.

**Successful Hunters**

Welsh Day Hunters, of Howard, R. D., bagged their limit of six deer, consisting of a 5-point, a 6-point, two 7-points, an 8-point and a 4-point.

Henry Kidwell of State College shot an 8-point buck on the Nixon farm, near State College, and brought it home early Friday morning.

Other kills reported in the State College area include a 6-point killed by Kermit Hurwitz of State College on Friday morning, and a 7-point bagged by E. D. James of State College on Saturday morning in the Black Moshannon area. Jim and Billy Holmes of State College were also successful hunters.

The Cold Springs Camp bagged five nice bucks by noon Saturday and broke camp. Honor members of the group is "Connie" Resides of State College, who has hunted in the camp for 25 years and bagged 24 deer.

**Fleet Foots Get Limit**  
The Fleet Foot Hunting Club, located on the side of Tussey Mountain, and consisting of ten members, ended its hunting season on Tuesday, December 5, at 11 o'clock. The hunt ended on what is called Hell's Half Acre on the Musser farm.

Klingler, 7-point; George G. Baker, 8-point; and Frank Homan, 5-point. They were the nicest deer and the largest racks ever gotten by the camp.
