was obtained from Centre County Coroner Dr. W. R. Heaton, of Philadelphia, who was in a short time the truck and its lifeless driver were taken to the Widdowson Funeral Home, North Allegheny street, the body later being taken to the Wetzler Funeral Home in Milesburg.

After conducting an investigation Monday night, Dr. Heaton pronounced that death was due to natural causes and denied an inquest unnecessary. Mr. Miller had apparently been in his usual good health up until the time of his death. A few moments before he had helped to load his truck with outgoing mail and had not complained of illness.

The deceased, who resided at The Forge, south of Bellefonte, was a native of that area, having been born there on August 12, 1875, making his age 64 years, 4 months and 6 days. He was a son of James and Annie Housel Miller, and is survived by his wife, the former Maude Irvin; a son and daughter; Ray Miller, at home, and Mrs. Linn Love, Bellefonte, and these brothers and sister: Joseph, of Buffalo, N. Y.; Caleb, Russell and James, all of Bellefonte, and Mrs. Maude Bathurst, of Altoona. Also surviving are 7 grandchildren, two of which, Phyllis and Joseph, reside with their grandparents.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock this Thursday afternoon at the home at The Forge, with the Rev. R. R. Bless, of State College, officiating. Interment will be made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

and arranges their schedules of visits. Any ill babies are referred to their family physicians, who prescribe for their care or send them to the various clinics, such as the orthopedic and tuberculosis.

Miss Siegal remembers 5 babies in her 10 months of service that have been referred to D. John Galbraith who conducts the orthopedic clinic at Philadelphia. The function of the Bellefonte clinic is to help to maintain in the small children of the community a normal development. The doctor reports that as a whole statistics prove that malnutrition here is low as compared with that of other places, and that the babies are in general good condition.

In December, and the volume of this type of mail has diminished perceptibly, Mr. Meek reports. The postmaster declared that stamp sales show an increase in the use of 3-cent stamps for Christmas greetings, instead of 1 1/2-cent stamps which have been quite popular for several years. Three-cent stamps give mail a first class rating and assure prompt handling. Envelopes bearing one-and-a-half-cent stamps are second class mail and are not given preference.

All departments of the postoffice will remain open until 8 o'clock Thursday and Friday nights, and all matter received at the postoffice up until Saturday night will be delivered, Mr. Meek said. Special delivery packages and Christmas mail arriving at the Bellefonte postoffice on Sunday will be delivered that day, he concludes.

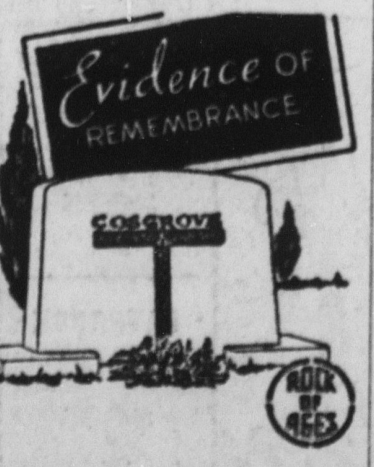
