Whiteman's program at State College included many semi-classical numbers. Mr. Meek, the writers in-ferred, was debauching the Power of the Press by shattering the idols The People worshipped.

Because they were scared to death of all sorts of imaginary horrors they feared might result from the mailing of the letter, the boys signed it "Two Devout Readers of Ink Slings."

Mr. Meek granted the letter the courtesy of a full and complete reply in the following issue of The Watchman, and while the column was read and studied by the writers of the anonymous letter, they got but little consolation from what Mr. Meek had to say on the subject.

Fourteen Christmas seasons have come and gone since then. Whiteman's orchestra, if we remember correctly, underwent financial difficulties during the depression, and was reorganized on a smaller and more slip-stick basis. Every now and then you see something in the newspapers about the band, but few will deny that it doesn't hold the spotlight as in years gone by.

Several years ago the orchestra played a dance engagement at Hecla Park. Although the two boys who had written the letter had long ceased to spend practically half of their conscious moments in the worship of Whiteman's music, they made it a point to attend the dance.

Whiteman apparently was in a grumpy mood. So far as we could ascertain, he didn't crack a smile all evening. Somehow or other we got the impression that he felt he was doing a great favor by coming to the hills and mountains of Bellefonte to play His Great Music. He definitely was not the roly-poly, jolly, smiling maestro of the Sunday supplements of radio guides. We felt that he and His Music were, in short, everything Mr. Meek had said they were in December 1925.

In fairness to a deposed idol it must be explained that on the afternoon of the dance, Mr. Whiteman's automobile had been involved in a collision with another machine at the corner of Allegheny and Linn streets, Bellefonte, and it may be that the mishap had something to do with what transpired at the dance.

As things now stand Mr. Meek can go ahead and blast Whiteman's "jaz" all he wants to, and we personally assure him that at least one of the Two Devout Readers of Ink Slings will never utter a protest. As for the other "Devout Reader" who is also now engaged in the newspaper business in Bellefonte, we haven't heard him mention Whiteman's music for the last decade.

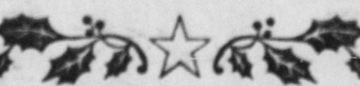
