W. G. WOODRING KILLED IN CRASH ON MOUNTAIN ROAD

Two Others Injured in Accident Early Christmas Morning

VICTIM PINNED IN WRECKAGE 2 HOURS

Inquest Scheduled Last Night

An inquest into the early Christmas morning automobile accident which claimed the life of Wesley Woodring, Jr., 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wesley G. Woodring. of Philipsburg, was to be held last night, Centre County Coroner Dr.

The accident occurred at 3 o'clock Monday near the Sandy Ridge summit of the Tyrone mountain when a Ford sedan, in which Wesley Woodring, Peter Brennish, 25, of Chester Hill, and Walter Harkless 35, of West Decatur, were occupants crashed killing Woodring and injuring the other two occupants.

Brennish and Harkless, both suffering minor injuries, were taken to the Philipsburg State Hospital where the attending physician yes, erday described their conditions as being good. Both are reported getting along nicely and will be discharged sometime soon.
