Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Give Cattle Minerals—Cattle

particularly making cows, require an adequate supply of minerals in their ration. According to dairy experts, specialists, steamed bone meal is the cheapest and most satisfactory mineral for adding the necessary lime and phosphorus to a dairy ration.

Protect Tender Plants—Alternates

freezing and thawing, particularly when there is little snow, may leave the plants from the soil or slowly cause the death of some of the less hardy varieties, say Penn State ornamental horticulturists. These injuries can largely be prevented by the application of a mulch.

Keep Birds Healthy—Proper

management usually will prevent proplis and cannibalism causing serious losses in the laying flock. Penn State poultry extension specialists have found the two troubles are closely associated.

Destroy Silver Fish—Silver fish

are usually found in damp or dark places. They feed on starch materials. According to Penn State entomologists, 12 parts sodium fluoride mixed with 100 parts wheat flour provides an excellent poison for killing the insects. Scatter the poison mixture behind boxes and under papers away from children and pets.

Repairing Farm Machinery—

Spending a few hours in the repair of farm machinery on winter days when other work is slack will save costly delays next summer during the rush season, agricultural extension engineers at Penn State remind. It is important that the repair job be done thoroughly.

Grow Feeds Properly—One way

to get better horse power for your farm is to give your foals proper care while they are developing. Claim livestock specialists at Penn State. This is particularly true the first year and especially during the first winter.
