Work of Taking Business Census Start

(Continued from Page 1)

The statistics do not disclose exactly or approximately the operation of a single establishment or a group of establishments under the same ownership.

The Business Census covers retail trade, wholesale trade, service business and laundries, theaters and other places of amusement, hotels and tourist courts or camps, and the construction business. It also covers that part of the business and sales finance companies which has to do with consumer installment paper (bought from retailers) arising from the sale of merchandise.

It further covers the primary distribution of manufacturers' sales to wholesalers, retailers, industrial users, etc. (the initial stage of distribution), and provides for tracing the sales of commodities through wholesale and retail channels.

The forthcoming census will cover the year ending December 31, 1939. The Census Bureau has tried to prepare these schedules to be as simple and explanatory as possible and limited them to essential information. In their preparation the Census Bureau has been guided by the advice of committees of representative business men. In other words, business men have asked for most of the questions in these various schedules.

The information asks for the volume of business for the year, 1939 (for each kind of business and for each State, county and city or town of more than 2,500 population), how much was done on credit, (open account and installment separately), stocks on hand at the beginning and end of the year, accounts receivable, number of employees, total payroll, extent of self-employment (proprietor-owners and unpaid family members), and other inquiries limited to particular field of business as shown by the schedules such as breakdown of sales by commodities in the case of retailers and wholesalers or room capacity in the case of hotels.

The Business Census will cover approximately 1,700,000 retailers, 180,000 wholesalers, 750,000 service businesses, 50,000 hotels, tourist camps or courts, 50,000 theatres and other places of amusement, 293,000 construction contractors and about 2,500 sales finance companies. Hundreds of detailed kind-of-business classifications are required in these business fields and separate area reports must be made for 48 States, 16 principal cities, 3,072 counties and about 3,150 cities and towns of more than 2,500 population.

TEST SHOWS SEWAGE PLANTS ARE EFFECTIVE

William S. Crumlish, Sanitary engineer for the U. S. Department of Agriculture at Belville, Md., and son of Mr. and Mrs. Huga Crumlish, of Pleasant Gap, submitted the following item concerning the effectiveness of sewage disposal plants, in the belief that Bellefonte residents will be particularly interested because of the new plant recently placed in operation in this community.

The item follows: "A study was completed in connection with the possible spread of tuberculosis and other communicable diseases to animals coming in contact with the effluent of modern sewage treatment plants. The sewage of the various units of the Research Center, of which the Animal Disease Station is one, is carried to a common sewage treatment plant of the modern type where the following treatment is administered: Pre-chlorination, flocculation, primary settling, trickling filters, and final settling and chlorination.

The effluent, after the various treatments, was fed thrice weekly to healthy cattle and swine at the Animal Disease Station. These animals were carefully observed during this period and for a further 6 months, following the feeding period of effluent of 6 months, these animals were killed. A thorough post-mortem examination of each of these animals failed to show any evidence of disease as a result of his feeding, indicating that sewage treatment plants of the modern type when properly operated are very efficient in rendering sewage harmless."

DOCTOR STRICKEN DURING OPERATION

In the midst of an operation on a woman patient in St. Mary's Hospital, Orange, N. J., Tuesday, Dr. Alton K. Sherman, 51, staggered, grasped his chest and whispered to an assistant to "carry on."

Dr. Joseph Bove completed the operation for removal of a tumor successfully and then went into an adjoining room to see Dr. Sherman.

"Don't mind me, go back to the patient," Dr. Sherman said in a barely audible voice. Before Dr. Bove could tell the older surgeon the operation was finished, Dr. Sherman died of a heart attack.

Horse Latitude

Horse latitude is the name given to the belt of calm in the North Atlantic ocean between the region of westerly winds of the higher latitudes and the region of trade winds of the torrid zone. Authorities differ in regard to the origin of the name, some claiming that it was derived from the fact that vessels with a cargo of horses were often so delayed on account of the calm that the animals perished from lack of water.

Secretary of Internal Affairs

William S. Livengood, Jr., asks that coal consumers be watchful of the quantities delivered and to report suspected weight shortages to local sealers of weights and measures for checking up.

"So many complaints of short weight in truck deliveries of hard coal have been received by this department recently," said Secretary Livengood, "that we are asking the support of coal consumers in the drive now underway to break up the practice.

"County and local sealers of weights and measures are co-operating heartily with the departments. Their efforts to correct the evil can be greatly helped by purchasers of coal checking carefully the quantities purchased and reporting promptly all suspected shortages. In all cases receipts should be required, bearing the name of the seller and the weight purchased.

"To ascertain with approximate accuracy the number of tons of hard coal in a bin, find the cubic contents by multiplying its height by its width by its depth, and multiply this result by the average weight of a cubic foot of anthracite coal, which is 66.27, dividing this by 2,000, the number of pounds in a ton."

"While Mike Demchak, of Osceola Mills, was going home Monday from the Philipsburg hospital after having a leg amputated above the knee following a gangrene infection, his brother, Peter Demchak, was admitted to the hospital as a patient. James Neilson, Osceola Mills coal operator, had a finger amputated at the hospital. His hand had been injured in a mine accident.

Asks Neighbors For Help
