Funeral services were held at Hopewood Memorial Chapel in Pittsburgh, Monday, for Ambrose N. Diehl, graduate of Pennsylvania State College and for 15 years a trustee of that institution, who died of pneumonia at LaJolla, Cal., on Wednesday. He was 63. morphine sulphate—a derivative of opium. An investigation revealed that although 20 different names appeared on the prescriptions, two persons, identified as Neil Bowen Young and Frank Young, of Hymer, got all of the dope, it is said. The narcotics inspector stated in court that when confronted with this evidence, Dr. Ishler readily admitted his guilt. For this reason the inspector said, the prosecution was not demanding a jail sentence, since Dr. Ishler's ready confession eliminated the necessity of a long and expensive investigation. In his own behalf Dr. Ishler stated that at first he didn't know the two persons were drug addicts, and that after he learned they were he gave them prescriptions "to get them out of the office." The present offense was Dr. Ishler's first violation of the law.
