New Disease Is Threat to Potatoes

Bacterial ring rot is a new potato disease against which Pennsylvania potato growers are warned by Dr. O. D. Burke, assistant extension plant pathologist with the Pennsylvania State College. Farmers frequently refer to the disease as bacterial wilt.

He explains that the disease is the biggest problem potato growers have had to face in a half century. In cutting the seed potatoes for planting the bacteria which cause the disease the cutting knife to other tubers. In the fields, the disease spreads from plant to plant.

Dr. Burke emphasizes the imporance of buying clean seed since this is the only known method for the control of the disease
