

OBITUARY

JACOB O. THIEL

Jacob O. Thiel, prominent Claysburg resident and native of Centre County, died at his home Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock following an extended illness. Born at Romola, Centre county, he pursued farming until 1919 when he went to Claysburg where he was employed by the General Refractories company there. Members of the family include his wife, Mrs. Lydia Thiel, and one sister, Mrs. Mary Pogman, of Hubersburg. Mr. Thiel was a member of the Grace Evangelical and Reformed church of Claysburg and was a member of the congregation's consistory. He was also a member of Lick Run Lodge, I. O. O. F.

GEORGE GORDON AKE

George Gordon Ake, a lifelong resident of Tyrone who moved to Boalsburg four years ago, died at the home of his brother, Robert Ake, in Youngstown, Ohio, at 10 o'clock Friday morning. Mr. Ake, who was born in Altoona on January 8, 1864, had been suffering from a heart condition for the past two weeks. He was a son of Harry C. Ake and May Elza Kephart, both deceased. His brother, Robert, is his only surviving relative. Mr. Ake was a member of the Presbyterian church in Tyrone. The funeral was held from the Graham and Gate funeral home in Tyrone on Monday afternoon. Burial was made in Grand View cemetery, with Rev. J. P. Jackson officiating.

MRS. ELIZABETH KIRK

Mrs. Elizabeth Kirk, native of Centre county, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mary K. Anderson, at Central City, Nebraska, on Saturday morning from the effects of a stroke suffered several days earlier. She was a daughter of Edward and Margaret Johnson and was born in Centre county 85 years ago. As a young woman she left Pennsylvania and had resided in Illinois until three years ago when she went to Nebraska to be with her daughter. Survivors include a sister, Mrs. William McKinley, of Centre Hall, and an aunt, Mrs. Mahon Johnson, of Bellefonte, R. D. 3. Funeral services were held on Monday at Central City, Neb., with interment in that city. Mrs. Kirk had visited relatives and friends in the Bellefonte area at various times in recent years.

D. P. HARPSTER

D. P. Harpster, a former resident of Tyrone and for the past forty years a resident of California, died in a Los Angeles, California, hospital on February 3 following a week's illness with a heart condition.
