

SEEING THE LIVING ROOM IN A "NEW LIGHT"



Long neglected ceiling fixtures take on new life with the addition of silvered bowl bulbs and decorative clip-on caps. The living room is a pleasanter place with the low cost "luxury" of indirect light.

It's surprising how often the ceiling fixture in the living room lags behind while the rest of the furnishings in the room acquire a more modern style. The family falls in the habit of not using the fixture, vaguely hoping that if they turn on the light no one will notice it.

This is really only wishful thinking—for the fixture is there in plain view, lighted or not. And often it has the added eyesore of empty sockets or burnt-out bulbs.

Sometimes it's not possible to replace the fixture, but the home-maker wishes she could do something to improve it. One of the most practical ideas to date for restyling the cluster or shower fixture is the development of small modernizers that slip on to silvered bowl lamps and are screwed into the sockets of the fixture.

While there is a single socket fixture in the living room, a silvered bowl bulb and one of the new adapters can easily be screwed into the ceiling outlet. There are many attractive styles in these adapters, decorated in either silver or gold finish. They are light-weight, inexpensive and neatly designed. You'll be proud to have guests see your living room in a new light—and you and the family will enjoy the living room more.

The advantage that housewives are quick to appreciate with this new indirect lighting equipment is the fact that the reflector surface is sealed to the bulb where no dirt or dust can reach it and out down its lighting efficiency.
