County To Increase Tax Rate

272. A 1-mill increase on the tax rate for County purposes will yield about \$10,500 for the current year, which is considerably less than the increase for debt service.

In the Institution District account much the same condition exists. In 1938 the County Commissioners borrowed \$127,000 through a bond issue for the erection of a County Home. Under the procedure adopted by the Commissioners at that time it was made necessary for the county to levy taxes to pay off \$15,000 in principal and \$2,968 in interest and taxes, or a total of \$17,968 during 1940.

In addition to the bond issue, the debt of the Institution District as of January 1, 1939 was \$13,500, and during that year the former board of Commissioners borrowed an additional \$28,000, making the floating indebtedness of the district at the beginning of this year \$41,500.

In 1940 the present board of Commissioners proposes to pay off \$16,000 of the temporary debt, and must pay \$4,794 for interest and taxes, or a total of \$20,794 on the temporary loans.

A levy of one mill brings a return of about \$10,500 for the budget year. The proposed 2-mill extra levy for the Institution District will bring a return of about \$21,000 which will securely meet the amount needed solely for service on temporary loans.

Under the 5-mill Institution District levy last year the former Commissioners not only did not reduce any of the temporary indebtedness existing at that time, but borrowed an additional \$28,000 to operate the district.

A study of the proposed budget for 1940, appearing elsewhere in this issue of The Centre Democrat reveals a proposed expenditure of \$2,400 payable to the Commonwealth by the county from collection of fines, most of which were prior to 1938. These fines were never turned over to the State by the county, and when the former Commissioners were questioned about the matter last year it is reported that they indicated the amount would be included in this year's budget. The amount, therefore, is included in the budget.
