Rev. Walter Pugh, of Lancaster gave a motion picture on Home Missions in the Reformed church Tuesday evening.

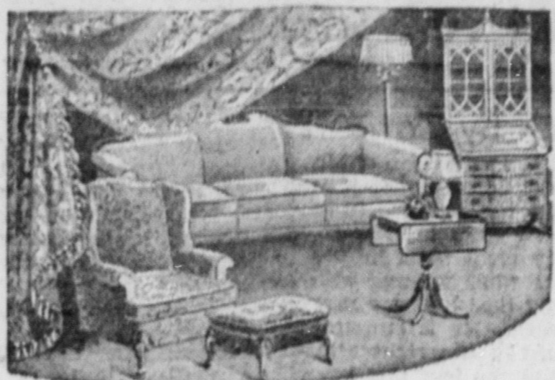

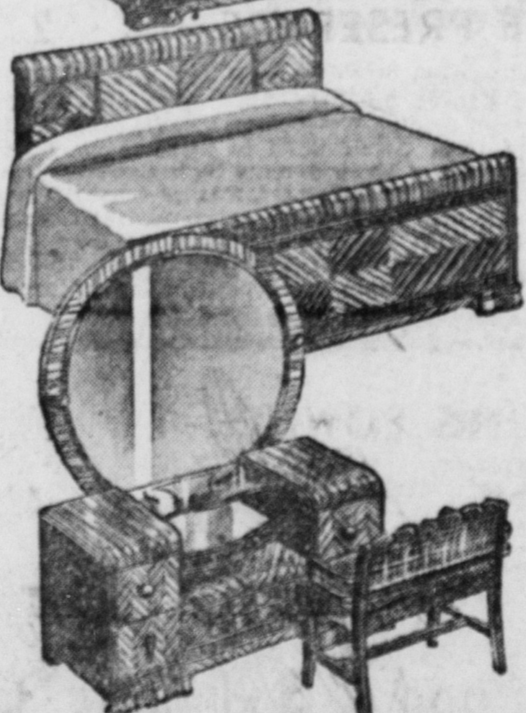
