WILSON GRANT HAMER

Wilson Grant Hamer, of Tyrone, died at the State hospital, Phillipsburg, Sunday morning, Nov. 23, 1899 at Fort Matilda, he was a son of Levi and Eliza (Frank) Hamer. Moyer, for the past several years fireman at the Centre county court house, died at 9:40 o'clock last Thursday morning at his home on Blanchard street, after a lingering illness with a heart condition. Mr. Moyer had not been able to work for more than two months. The deceased was a son of Frank and Mary Gordon Moyer and was born at Curtin on July 10, 1875, making his age at time of death 64 years, 7 months, and 19 days. In 1897 he was united in marriage with Cora Bell Barrett, who survives with three sons: Guy and Merrill Moyer, both of Pleasant Gap, and DeForest, Russell and Bill Moyer, all at home. Other survivors include a daughter, James Moyer, who is a missionary in China. Mr. Moyer was a member of the Methodist church, the L. O. O. M., and the Red Men's lodge, Bellefonte. HENRY KAHLMUS

Henry Kahlmus, for the past 15 years a well known resident of Bellefonte and retired mechanical draftsman and merchant of Philadelphia, died suddenly about 1 o'clock Friday afternoon at his home on East High street from the effects of a heart attack suffered a few minutes before. Mr. Kahlmus became ill at his home from the table after eating lunch. Earlier in the day he had been in his usual good health and had spent part of the morning downtown, making final arrangements to move into an apartment in the Keystone Gazette building. Mr. Kahlmus was a son of John and Christina Kahlmus and was born in Philadelphia on June 23, 1866, making his age at time of death 73 years, 8 months and 8 days. On May 15, 1889 he was united in marriage with Margaret Bartholomew, who survives. An only daughter, Mrs. John Smith, died in Bellefonte 12 years ago. Among the survivors are two sisters: Mrs. Martin V. Burton, of Philadelphia, and Mrs. Arthur Baird, of Osceola Mills. The deceased was a member of the Presbyterian church and of the Lippard lodge of Philadelphia. During most of his active life he was employed as a draftsman in the Philadelphia area, and for several years was a merchant in that city. He retired about 20 years ago and five years later the family moved to Bellefonte to make their home. Funeral services were

held at the Widowson Funeral Home, North Allegheny street, Monday afternoon, with the Rev. William C. Thompson, pastor of the Bellefonte Presbyterian church, officiating. Interment was made in the Union cemetery here.
