Borough Sued For Damages

(Continued from Page 1) is alleged that the Borough of Bellefonte, owners of the mill property and the race supplying water to the mill, were careless, negligent, reckless and heedless in the following respects: 1. In allowing the youth on the premises. 2. In "inviting and permitting" him to play on the roof over the race. 3. In failing to adequately enclose the property with a fence. 4. In failing to maintain a proper and adequate fence about the premises. 5. In maintaining an improper and inadequate gate on the existing fence. 6. In failing to keep the gate closed. 7. In maintaining a place attractive to children without providing protection. 8. In failing to maintain a fence on the low roof, which is described as being "readily accessible." 9. In failing to regard the protection of the lives and health of persons permitted on the premises. The statement claims damages because of large funeral and burial expenses and because of the loss of wages, earnings, services and society of the plaintiffs son.
