

### NYA To Compile Logan's History

#### Project Also Will Include Roster of Firemen; Shoemaker is Supervisor

The National Youth Administration has approved a project to provide clerical assistance to the Logan Fire Company, Bellefonte, for the purpose of segregating the company's minutes and helping to compile a history of the organization. The work began yesterday. It was announced by W. I. Scott, NYA Supervisor for Centre county.

The project will employ a stenographer from the Bellefonte district, and is supervised by Collins Shoemaker, secretary of the company.

According to County Supervisor Scott the work will consist in breaking down the records of all meetings that the fire company has held since 1872. Salient facts and interesting data necessary to compiling the Logan's history will then be taken from the minutes, including a complete roster of living and deceased members.

In approving the project State NYA Administrator, Walter S. Cowing, of Harrisburg, said he was happy to assist the fire company in carrying out its useful public work

and at the same time provide work opportunity and experience for an unemployed youth.

"A cardinal objective of this project," Mr. Cowing said, "as well as the 2000 other NYA operates in Pennsylvania, other than mere physical accomplishment is to inculcate in youth proper work habits and to give them actual work experience."

"On these projects," the state youth leader continued, "the youth have the opportunity to test their abilities, develop their skills, earn a dollar's pay for a dollar's work and at the same time render a benefit to the community."

### Phantom Lake Shows Signs of Appearing

Centre county's famed "Phantom Lake," near the Bellefonte airport, shows some indications of making its appearance if the present thaw continues. It is reported by residents of the area.

The lake, which last made its appearance during the St. Patrick's Day flood of 1936, is formed by water which pours from a sink hole on the Harry Tressler farm, and is believed to result from the overflow of an underground stream.

In 1936 the lake covered an area of many acres, and covered a lengthy section of the back road between Zion and Pleasant Gap.

Yesterday it was reported that a small portion of the road was covered by water, but this water is believed to be surface water from melting snow. The sink hole which is the source of the "Phantom Lake" is dry.

### Illegal Hunter Loses Car and Gun

#### Spotting Deer With Lights Proves Expensive Pastime For Tioga Man

Hunting deer out of season at night with artificial lights is an expensive pastime. As a result of indulging in this kind of sport, a Tioga county hunter has been deprived of his car, his gun and his flashlight, all of which were confiscated by the Game Commission officers who arrested him February 11, at 1:30 a. m., two miles west of Galeton, Potter county.

The equipment is being sold, announced Game Protector Miles Reeder, of Lock Haven, and the proceeds are being kept by the Game Commission. The car, sold at Lock Haven Saturday, brought \$102.95, something less than half the amount of the fine assessed against the car owner, Charles Wilson Howland, living near Knoxville.

Howland, who was arrested with Ernest Hunter of the same address, had a 1935 Ford V-8 sedan. The pair had a deer in the car when taken into custody. Their spotlight and rifle were seized along with the car, and each of them was fined \$200 and ordered to pay the costs of \$7.25 by Justice of the Peace W. A. Ham, of Coudersport.
