CHARLES MABUS.

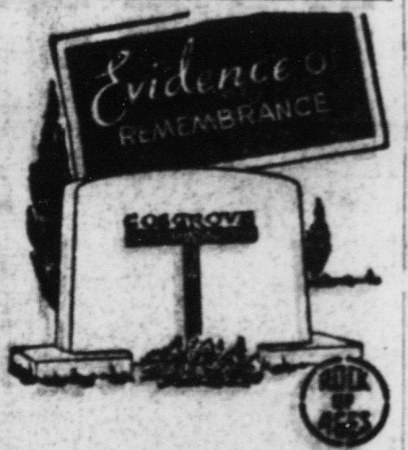
