Hall originally was sentenced to die, but his sentence was commuted to life imprisonment when physicians declared that his head would be torn off by hanging, since at the time of murder Hill was found near the woman with his throat badly cut. At Rockview Hill was a model prisoner and financed his efforts to obtain a parole by carving objects out of bone which he sold to visitors to the prison. He always maintained he was innocent, claiming that the person who slew the man also cut his throat.


