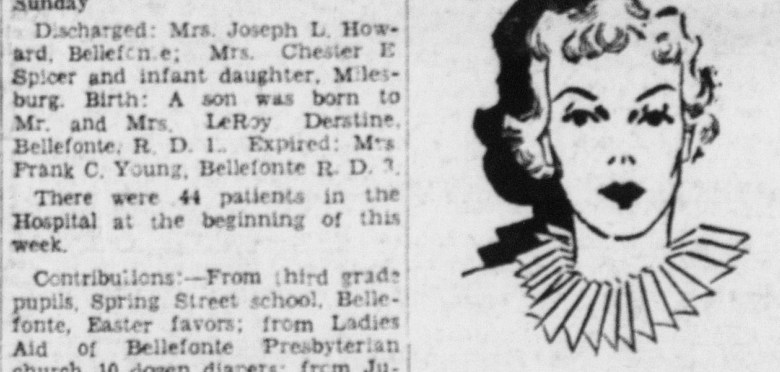
To Poll Parents On P. T. A. Question
