Symposium To Be Held By CDA

Event Will Mark 100th Anniversary of Death of Prince Gallitzin

The regular meeting of Court Patrick McArdle, Catholic Daughters of America, was held Monday night in the court room, West High street, with more than 50 members present. Grand Regent, Louise A. Carpeneto, presided.

At the meeting final arrangements were completed for a symposium on the life of the prince-priest, Demetrius Augustine Gallitzin, scion of a Russian noble family, and founder of the town of Loretto, Cambria county, to be held in Bellefonte, April 11, in the court room. The symposium, marking the 100th anniversary of the death of the famous priest, known as the "Apostle of the Alleghenies," is the first of symposiums to be held in this district during the month of April.

Mrs. Mary Gray, of West High street, will represent the local Court at all the meetings at which Rt. Rev. Bishop Richard T. Gilfoyle of the Altoona diocese will attend. The public is cordially invited to attend the symposium.

In addition to routine business it was decided to discontinue card parties during this month because of various court activities. A large card party will be held during May. The annual auditor's report was read by Mrs. Edith Anderson, member of the committee of which Mrs. Elizabeth O'Hara is chairman. Following the meeting colored motion pictures of the Flag Day parade held June 14 of last year were shown by Samuel D. Rhine-smith, then Commander of the American Legion of Bellefonte, and who was in charge of Flag Day activities.

There has been no inbreeding in these animals. Always new sires replaced old ones when there was a danger of that. All of them have been of the Langwater and Glenwood strains.

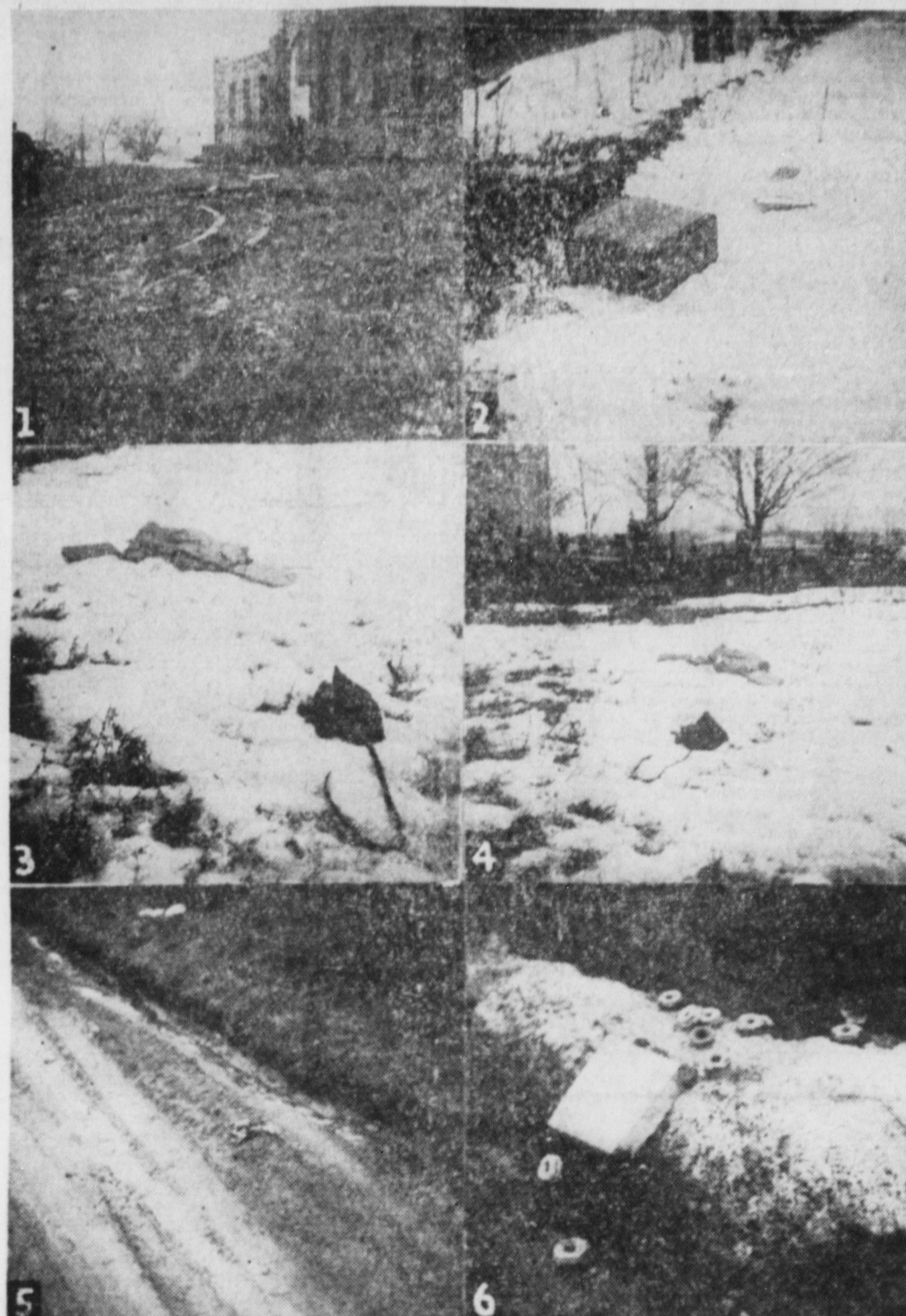
These animals are not show cattle. So far as breeding is concerned there are none better in this country. They have been fed for production, but they are part of the herd that won the Pennsylvania State College Creamery's prize for butterfat content so regularly that it was withdrawn.

The offering includes seven cows, six in milk. One was fresh in December, one in January and one in March. Another will calve this or next month and another in June. Five heifers over two years old and bred; 3 heifers 18 months; 2 yearlings and five female calves under 6 months.

Murder Scene and Clues



In the above group of photos, all taken before any of the objects were moved, are some of the meager clues with which police have to work in the solution of this brutal murder of Rachel Taylor, Penn State co-ed, whose mutilated body was found last Thursday morning in front of the College Township School at Lemont.

Photo No. 1 shows tracks supposedly made by the slaver's car as he turned sharply in a muddy area beside the school driveway. The victim's body was found at the extreme left, in front of the spectator who is partially visible in the photo. The box covers a clear imprint of the car's tires.

Photo No. 2 shows Miss Taylor's luggage case, a textbook and a notebook, thrown over a fence opposite Shiloh church along the Bellefonte-State College road.

Photo No. 3. Further in the field at Shiloh church were the victim's coat and handbag, seen in the above photo.

Photo No. 4 shows the relative position of the various articles.

Photo No. 5 pictures the blood-smeared man's handkerchief found in the road at Shiloh church. Handkerchief is near exact center of photo.

Photo No. 6. The clue that failed! These doughnuts found along the highway about 300 yards east of Shiloh church were later discovered to have been stale doughnuts thrown away Wednesday night by a State College bakery owner.
