### Police Baffled By Taylor Murder

es of the State Motor Police. Yesterday the investigation turned to Bellefonte when a resident of East Curtin street turned over to police a pair of blood-stained slippers which the man had found several days previously along a sidewalk near his home. The finder at first placed little significance in the find, and had thrown the underclothing in an ash can. Later he realized that the clothing might be a clue and notified police.

The steps may prove to be of value, since no such underclothing was found on or near the body at the time of its discovery.

New rumors of sensational "finds" or of even more sensational "arrests" drift about Bellefonte and other Centre county towns almost hourly. Few of them have any foundation in fact, and others based on some trifling story, assume vast importance in their rumors.

Semi-official reports have it that police investigating the crime are actually "against a stone wall." At the close of each day's work, officers gather at Rockview barracks to report their finds and to make plans for the next day. Many of the tips being received as a result of the rewards posted are found to have been in touch with the investigators.

able reports have it that the investigation is centering in State College, the general belief being that Miss Taylor knew the person whose car she entered, and that the person was familiar with the roads in and around State College.

**Rewards Offered**  
The Centre County Commissioners, at a meeting Friday, and acting upon the advice of Lt. Norman R. Anich, who is directing the State Police investigation, offered a reward of \$1000 for the arrest and conviction of the slayer. The offer carries no reflection on the police, the Commissioners pointed out, but was made in the hope that someone having valuable information would get in touch with the investigators.

The State College Borough Council, acting through a resolution, on Monday night voted to post a \$500 reward. Each of the four classes at Penn State have offered \$200 from the general class funds; the Penn State Collegian, student newspaper, posted \$100, and a committee composed of various student leaders at Penn State has set out to raise an additional \$100, bringing the total of rewards actually posted to date, \$2,500.

In addition, residents of Wildwood, N. J., home of the slain student, are in the process of collecting a "substantial" fund to offer as a reward.

**CCC Camp Cleared**  
Last week when a group of visiting newspaper reporters called at the Howard Nursery CCC camp near Mt. Eagle, the rumor got about the police were investigating camp members as possible suspects in the slaying.

Lt. Abbott, commanding officer of the camp, reports that at no time during the probe have police visited the camp and no suspicion has been attached to camp members. He added that all members of the camp were accounted for during the night of the slaying.

From other official sources it is learned that at no time have investigators had any reason to suspect any members of the CCC camp.

**STATE COLLEGE SCHOOLS TO OPEN SEPTEMBER 9**  
The State College borough schools will open for the 1940-41 year on Monday, September 9, the State College school board announced this week.

Miss Betty Springer, a graduate of Penn State who has had two years' teaching experience, was named teacher of physical education in the elementary grades and assistant in the high school. The post has been vacant since the resignation last fall of Miss Luella McCurdy.

### Police Seeking Hit-Run Driver

Car Speeds Away After Injuring 15-Year-Old Boy Here

Police have been unsuccessful in the quest for a hit-run driver who on Sunday struck and injured a Bellefonte youth.

The victim, Charles "Bud" Eckenroth, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Eckenroth, of East Bishop street, suffered cuts about the head and face and bruises about the body about 9 o'clock Sunday night when he was struck by a car on North Allegheny street, in front of the Boston Candy Kitchen.

The youth was hurled for a short distance by the impact. The driver, who was traveling north on Allegheny street, sped away.

Eckenroth was taken to the Centre County Hospital where his injuries were treated. His glasses and a clarinet he was carrying as he stepped out into the street were broken.

Bystanders who saw the accident gave a description of the car and a license number to borough police officer, Donald Johnson, who was attracted to the scene by the noise of the impact. Johnson sped in the direction the hit-run driver had taken, but failed to locate the car. State Motor Police at Pleasant Gap are cooperating in the search for the driver.
