8 Acquitted In Campaign Trial

All-Republican Jury Frees Democratic State Head and Associates

Eight men who were charged with conspiracy to assess the public payroll for political purposes, were acquitted Friday afternoon in Dauphin County Court by an all-Republican jury, which took but four hours to reach a verdict.

The verdict, returned at 4:18 p. m., on the seventeenth day of the trial, was greeted by a rousing demonstration from a half-filled courtroom that even the tipstaffs and the court clerk could not quiet for several seconds.

Those whom the jury found not guilty are: David L. Lawrence, of Pittsburgh, chairman of the State Democratic Committee; Carl K. Deen, of Camp Hill, resident secretary of the State Democratic Committee; and the following Dauphin county residents: Robert M. Payer, chairman of the Dauphin County Democratic Committee; Wendell P. C. Morgenthaler, treasurer of the County Democratic Committee; Clyde H. Smith, former head of the county Democratic finance committee; William B. Freeland and Frank R. Hean.

Through the trial, which opened on March 25, the defense argued that all contributions by State employees were "voluntary" and introduced a string of former Democratic jobholders who testified they had never been "forced" to contribute to the campaign fund.

Fifty-eight witnesses, including a score of character witnesses, were called by the defense.

The Commonwealth, on the other hand, contended that the State employees were "forced" to contribute to the campaign fund under threats of dismissal or furloughs and by coercion and intimidation. The pro-

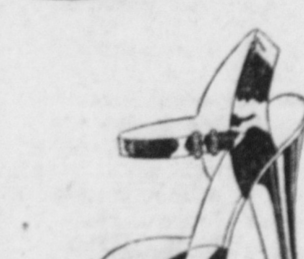
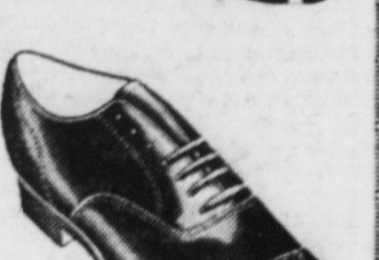

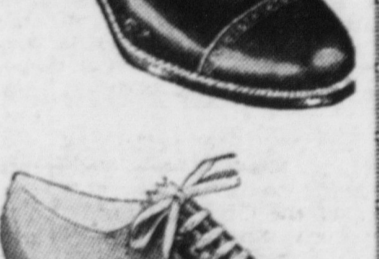
