To insure competency in each department of the club every chairman should be provided with sufficient funds for the year's requirements. This year the State Federation asks all club officers and department chairmen to submit a proposed budget for the ensuing year's activities.
Mrs. James G. Chalfont of Pittsburgh, State Chairman of organization, spoke briefly on the modern set up of club organization, saying there are over 700 federated clubs in Pennsylvania.
