Aviation Course to Be Given at Bellefonte

The Pittsburgh Institute of Aeronautics, a U. S. Government approved aviation school with headquarters at the Pittsburgh-Bettis Airport, Homestead, Pa., is now organizing local classes in the above mentioned place, where men can get aeronautical training without the expense of going away to residential schools.

The course is given through extension training combined with local weekly evening classes in charge of competent instructors.

The final part of this training is conducted at Pittsburgh-Bettis Airport, where the student receives four weeks of very intensive practical training and where they do in practice those things which they have learned in theory through extension and class room work. A certificate is issued to all students when they have completed all the subjects of his prescribed course and satisfactorily passed his examinations.

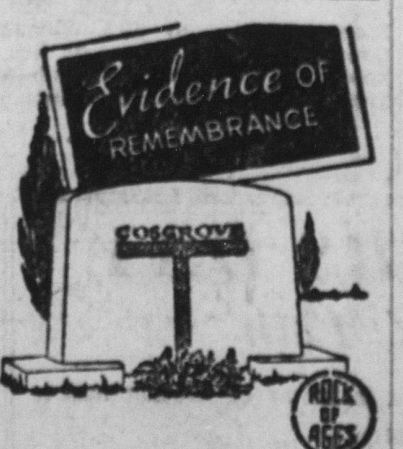
