

# THE WAR IN EUROPE

News from the battlefield in Norway is discouraging to the Allied cause. German forces, better equipped, have swept forward from Oslo bases and all but wiped up the earth with Norwegian and Allied opposition.

The fighting in Norway is divisible into three phases, so far, with the fourth about to begin. In the first phase, German forces suddenly attacked important Norwegian ports and secured commanding grip upon rail communications. In the second, the British Navy scored a point, strafing German ships and successfully landing Allied soldiers under great difficulties.

The third phase, represented by fast moving columns, seeking to dominate the central area of Norway, appears to have been favorable to the Germans. The Allied forces moving to the aid of the shattered Norwegians, were without adequate equipment or artillery and had little or no effective airplane support.

**German Air Force Wins.**  
The German, taking advantage of the mountainous country, used airplane superiority to the utmost. With bases in Norway and Denmark they had a tremendous advance over their enemies. Consequently their planes harried the troops that were hurried inland and hampered the landing of reinforcements of men and material at bases that were not only inadequately defended by anti-aircraft guns but poorly equipped to handle the discharge of the cargoes forced into them by the exigencies of warfare.

Considerable criticism of Allied strategy has been directed at those responsible for the dispatch of Allied soldiers, mostly British, into a war zone without adequate supporting equipment. This criticism, it seems to us, does not take into consideration the necessity for prompt Allied reinforcements to encourage the Norwegians, who might have made a separate peace with Germany unless promptly supported.

**The Struggle for Trondheim.**  
The key point in recent fighting has been Trondheim, the important port on the west coast. Germany was anxious to link her land forces there with the main strength at Oslo and the Allies were just as anxious to prevent this by cutting off Trondheim so as to capture it for a future base of operations.

Trondheim is one of the great fjords that marks the Norwegian coast. It is protected from sea attacks by a strong fort, ten miles westward. To make an effective naval attack Allied warships would have to be in great strength and assume the risk of considerable losses. Nevertheless, the advantage is so great that such an attack may be attempted.

Three railroads run from Trondheim. One to the north by Steinjer, one to the east toward Sweden, and one to the south, through the forests, south through the Gudbrands valley and eastward through the Oster valley. Both of these lines finally reach Oslo.

**Italy May Enter Conflict.**  
The Norwegian fighting may have an important effect upon other nations. Italy, wavering between Mussolini's plan to assist Hitler and the desire to avoid warfare, may take the plunge. This will undoubtedly spread warfare into the Mediterranean, the smaller nations of the Balkans and bring Turkey into the conflict.

Failure of the Allies, thus far, in Norway may have a powerful repercussion in the Netherlands, Belgium and Sweden. In any event, Hitler to map other serious advances into these neutral states and might possibly encourage a com-

## Decisive Battle in France

It should not be assumed that the battle for Norway is over or that it will determine the outcome of the war although, admittedly, either side may gain positions of great strategic value for future use. The war will be decided, in the long run, by the Allied naval supremacy unless there is an catastrophic debacle in France. The blockade continues to pinch Germany and as fighting becomes more general the lack of oil is expected to be a handicap to the Teutons.

Hitler, it is believed, would have launched his super-offensive months ago if he had been confident of the result. Every week has diminished the chances of success for any great push. The Allies are much stronger today and better prepared for defense against a Teutonic avalanche, even if it is aided by an Italian attack.
