Seek To Prevent More Slayings

radio equipment installed, Tuesday night greatly facilitate the search for clues.

Police are without any definite suspects, the Commissioner intimated, but he added that there are plenty of clues and that each one is being checked as rapidly as possible.

Other sources close to the investigation revealed that many of the persons who were checked in the early days of the Taylor slaying, have been re-checked in the Gates murder, and that so far every one of them has proved an all-right alibi.

The 1938 tan Plymouth sedan which is reported to have followed Faye Gates and two companions from Bellefonte to the detour at Mt. Eagle, early Sunday morning, continues to be one of the strongest clues police have obtained to date, Col. Adams intimated.

Reports circulated yesterday to the effect that the driver of the sedan had reported to police that he and his "girl friend" had followed the Gates car to the detour, and had then continued along the detour while the Gates car continued to one of the girls homes, were emphatically denied yesterday by Col. Adams. He indicated that the original story concerning the sedan has not been changed by subsequent investigation.

A key found on the scene of the Gates murder Sunday morning is considered as a worthwhile clue, the police spokesman declared, but he declined to comment further upon the matter. The key was found about the 10 o'clock Sunday morning at the track near where Sheriff Miller's car had been parked while police were combing the scene for evidence. The site was not more than 50 feet from where the Gates car was found with the girl's slain body just in back of the left rear fender.

Developments since the murder include a mysterious "rain of terror" staged by two unidentified men at Curtin, late Monday night. Commissioner Adams yesterday evidenced little active interest in the matter insofar as any bearing it might have upon Sunday's slaying.

According to reports, the half-hundred residents of Curtin were greatly agitated by the strange actions of two men in a 1932 coupe between the hours of 8:30 p. m. Monday, and 2:30 a. m. Tuesday. The men first drew attention through their questions about the location of the homes of two families. Suspicion became aroused because here and there girls in both families. Subsequently the coupe is said to have driven back and forth along the roads in the area.

Finally one of the men got out of the car and made his way to the home of Maxey Schreffler, at Curtin, and Mrs. Schreffler reported he attempted to get in the back door. She screamed and the man fled.

Mr. Schreffler, who had not heard the screams, returned to the house a short time later. At about this time the car appeared, picked up the man who had hidden behind a hedge and left Curtin.

Police notified of the event, obtained the license number from an citizen of the area, found the back door of the Schreffler home badly scratched, and attempted to trace the car. Men of the community gathered in little groups, armed with shotguns, rifles and other weapons.

Nothing further happened until about 2 a. m. when a call came from Milesburg that the car had been found headed for Curtin. It did not reach that town, evidently having turned off a side road. Good descriptions of the men and the car were given police.

A flurry of excitement resulted Tuesday morning when a Coleville youth was taken to Rockview barracks for questioning and a Valley View girl with whom he has had dates, was picked up by police for questioning.

Upon the release of the youth shortly after the lunch hour, it was learned that he had been considered a possible suspect because on Monday morning he had taken a light suit, torn at one knee and splattered with mud, to a local dry cleaning establishment for cleaning and repairs.

In releasing the boy, Col. Adams declared that police had proved a better alibi for him than he could give for himself, and emphasized that he was entirely in the clear.

Reports have it that a week or more ago the boy was driving to Valley View when he had a flat tire. The road was wet and muddy, and in repairing it he got mud on his trousers and tore a hole in one knee.

Since the beginning of the investigation early Sunday morning, scores of tan cars have been checked. This angle is not confined to this area or this county. A motor police officer in an adjoining county reported that he had checked more than 100 tan cars himself on Sunday.

Police Seek One Man

State Police, judging from statements issued at various times since Sunday, are strongly of the opinion that one person is responsible for both the Taylor and Gates murders. There are many with dissenting opinions, some claiming that the Gates slaying is a "copy" of the Taylor matter. Still others have hinted that since two men were involved in the strange activities at Curtin Monday night, and in the reported kidnaping attempt on Mary Tomb, 17-year-old Milesburg girl on Sunday night, April 28, a total of three persons might be implicated in the top major crimes.

Police yesterday declined to issue any statement in regard to the Tomb kidnap attempt.

Among the leads reportedly being investigated by State Police, is one originating from the experience of a clerk in a State College drug store.

The girl, whose name is being
