Board Approves High School Site

Sched voted in favor of the old site. John Hunter, of Hunter & Caldwell, Altoona architects retained by the former board to aid in the building program, was present at the meeting, and went over the ground covered by the old board in regard to plans. While no action was taken in regard to approving the contract with the Altoona architects, no more was made to further the board's action of some weeks ago asking the Altoona firm to cancel the board's contract.

Two local carpenters appeared at the meeting to ask the board's permission to rent the high school site for a used car lot. They offered to put the lot in shape for such use and to pay a rental fee of \$15 a month. The board, after consideration, unanimously voted against the proposal.

Grand Jury In Session Here

The Water Department is now not only free of all floating indebtedness, but also has begun to reduce the bonded debt, for on Monday the department paid off the remaining \$600 on the Phoenix Mill mortgage and set aside an additional \$1000 towards a sinking fund to pay off the bonded indebtedness of the department.

A check for \$45 was received from the Chemical Lime Company for the services of the Logan Fire Company at a blaze last month at one of the company's plants. A check for \$20 from T. E. Jodon, of Pleasant Gap, was received for services of the Union Fire Company at the Jodon barn in Pleasant Gap some weeks ago. As has been the custom in the past one-half of each check will be turned over to the fire companies and the remainder will be retained by the borough.

Police reported that to date a total of 23 cars have been tagged for overdue parking since the outset of the present campaign against traffic regulations. The dog law enforcement officer reported collection of \$2 fines in each of seven violations of the dog law.

Council has taken all the necessary legal steps preparatory to offering for sale the former Borough home on South Potter street. No date has been set for the sale.

Council went on record to ignore any anonymous letters or other communications addressed to that body. The move was made upon receipt of an unsigned letter containing matter of a controversial nature.

Building permits were approved as follows: The County Commissioner Charles Hipple, for a two-story brick dwelling on West Lamb street, just west of the West Penn Power Company's sub-station; to Philip H. Benner for a home on East Logan street; to Mrs. James Saxton, for a home on Burnside street; and to the Bellefonte Trust Company for the addition of a new wing to the bank building on the Diamond.

Hit-Run Driver Sentenced Here

Walter D. Johnson, of Bellefonte, R. D. 1, pleading guilty to a charge of obtaining relief fraudulently, was sentenced to refund \$200 illegally obtained and to undergo a six months' suspended sentence.

J. E. Johnson, Jr., of Phillipsburg, pleading guilty to a drunken driving count, was sentenced to serve 30 days in jail and pay the costs of prosecution.

R. D. admitting a charge of relief chiseling, was sentenced to make restitution of funds fraudulently obtained and to serve 15 days in jail.
