## Man Is Released

One man was held in the County jail from Thursday night until Saturday night in what police termed "protective custody." The man, who resides only a few hundred yards from where Miss Gates' body was found, was taken into custody to prevent a possibility that neighbors, inflamed by rumors, might take matters into their own hands. In announcing the man's release, Sheriff Edward R. Miller said: "We knew feeling against him was strong and we decided to pick him up and either pin the crime on him or clear him of suspicion. His actions were thoroughly checked and he is now in the clear."

## One Man Job

Police still cling to the opinion that the slaying of Rachel Taylor early on the morning of March 28, and the murder of Fay Gates, less than six weeks later, are the work of the same person. When asked by the police adherents to this conviction, Col. Adams indicated that the Gates slaying imitated the Taylor murder so well that the two must have been done by the same person. He hinted that some features of the Taylor case, known only to police, were duplicated in the Gates slaying. In short, Commissioner Adams on several occasions has expressed the conviction that "He'll know the slayer when he finds him," but he declined to explain the statement. He also has said that no arrests will be made until they have the right person, except in such cases where arrests are mandatory or advisable for other reasons.

## Sedan Still a Clue

The Commissioner also declared that the tan sedan with the buggy whip aerial on the right side is still considered as a major clue in the Gates case. He discounted a suggestion that the 24-year-old girl's murder may have been on foot and made his escape without the aid of a car. The Commissioner declared that some distance down the "Spook Hollow" road, toward the victim's home, police found tracks in the muddy road where a car had been turned around. He added that it is the belief that Miss Gates' slaying, and the subsequent detour, turned around, and returned to the spot where the crime was committed. Commenting upon press criticisms regarding the handling of the County's two murders, Col. Adams declared that he is "no quitter" and "intends to see this thing through." He stated that in his 35 years of police experience he has never had so many men working on any case of this kind.

## Vagrants Picked Up

William Pittman, 29, of Six Mile Run, Bedford County, was arrested here last Thursday night by Bellefonte Borough police officer Donald Johnson and Deputy Sheriff James Huggs, after Pittman had called the FBI offices in Washington, D. C., and Pittsburgh, to report he was investigating the slayings. He is being held at the jail until his past has been checked. Leonard Murray, of Greenville, N. Y., was committed to the County jail Sunday night on a charge of vagrancy. He was arrested in Greencastle and brought here for questioning in the murders. John Kanick, of Johnstown, arrested in Howard last week on a vagrancy charge was sentenced to serve 30 days in the county jail. His record is being checked.

## Three Philadelphia Youths Arrested in Lancaster Tuesday Morning

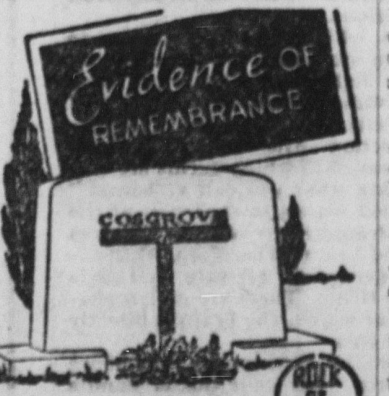
Three Philadelphia youths arrested in Lancaster Tuesday morning for traveling the wrong way on a one-way street, were jailed when police found guns in the car. Since the machine was a tan sedan, they are being questioned as to their activities about the time of the Gates slaying.

## Issues Warning

District Attorney Musser W. Gettig issued a warning that it is hazardous for any woman to accept rides with any man at night, even though they have known the man for some time. He expressed the belief that the slayer is probably normal in every outward respect; that he may have no criminal motives when he invites a woman into his car, and that the urge to attack and kill strikes with sudden and maniacal fury. This belief is supported by opinions of many others, some in official positions. The hysteria which swept the county after the Gates murder last week has subsided somewhat, but the suspicion, the rumors, the wary attitude of many, may continue until the murderer is in custody. Police, who last week expressed the fear that there may be other crimes before the fend is brought to justice, indicated that there will be no let up on 24-hour patrols daily of county highways and roads.

Police's ace sleuths, have been working steadily to uncover some lead pointing toward the slayer. They have been assisted by many State Motor Police officers, some in cars equipped with radio apparatus. Despite 24-hour patrols of most of the County's highways and byways, regardless of a steady flow of tips pouring into police from informants spurred by more than \$7,500 in rewards offered for the conviction of the slayer or slayers of the two girls, no arrests have been made, and several persons taken into custody for checking have been found to have no connection with the crimes.

He volunteered to go over with an advancing Battalion the afternoon of the same day. All of his work was done under heavy firing. His incessant devotion to the wounded, his ever readiness to volunteer for any mission where he felt that he might be of assistance, his utter disregard for personal safety, were an invaluable help in the fighting forces to which he was attached.

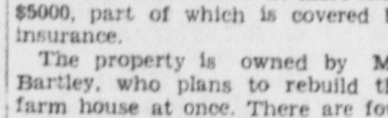

(a) That the "Second Paragraph" of the Articles of Incorporation of said Corporation, as heretofore granted, shall be amended so as to read as follows:  
"SECOND—The purpose for which said Corporation is formed is for the promotion of moral and social culture among its members, devotion to the cultivation of the intellect, the rendering of mutual aid and assistance in scholastic endeavor and the general welfare of the Pennsylvania State College and Beta Sigma Rho Fraternity and particularly Beta Chapter of said Fraternity at State College, Pa., in the following respects:  
(b) That the "Third Paragraph" of the Articles of Incorporation of said Corporation, as heretofore granted, shall be amended so as to read as follows:  
"THIRD—The registered office of the Corporation shall be at the Chapter House of Beta Sigma Rho Fraternity in the Borough of State College, County of Centre, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and the duties of the Corporation shall be transacted at such registered office and at such other place or places as may be designated by the by-laws."  
(c) That the "Eighth Paragraph" of the Articles of Incorporation of said Corporation, as heretofore granted, shall be amended so as to read as follows:  
"EIGHTH—The business of the Corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors, the number of Directors, their qualifications, terms of office, manner of election, compensation, powers and duties shall be as prescribed in the by-laws."  
(d) That the "Eleventh Paragraph" of the Articles of Incorporation of said Corporation, as heretofore granted, shall be amended so as to read as follows:  
"ELEVENTH—The persons already ready members of Beta Sigma Rho, whether they be alumni or former students of the Pennsylvania State College, as well as those who shall be hereafter initiated by Beta Chapter of Beta Sigma Rho while students at the Pennsylvania State College and Associate and Honorary members of said Chapter, shall be members of this Corporation, subject to the rules, regulations, and provisions of the by-laws of the Corporation."  
(e) That the "Twelfth Paragraph" of the Articles of Incorporation of said Corporation, as heretofore granted, shall be amended so as to read as follows:  
"TWELFTH—The election of officers and directors shall be held annually at the Beta Sigma Rho Chapter House in the Borough of State College, aforesaid, on Alumni Day of the Pennsylvania State College, or at such other time and place and in such other manner as may be prescribed by the by-laws."  
(f) That the "Fourteenth Paragraph" of the Articles of Incorporation of said Corporation, as heretofore granted, shall be amended so as to read as follows:

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"TWELFTH—The election of officers and directors shall be held annually at the Beta Sigma Rho Chapter House in the Borough of State College, aforesaid, on Alumni Day of the Pennsylvania State College, or at such other time and place and in such other manner as may be prescribed by the by-laws."
