PREVENTION OF CANNIBAL-ISM IN SMALL CHICKS

Over crowding is undoubtedly the nost common cause of cannibalism chicks. While it may occur in lots of very young chicks it usually appears after they have outgrown their brooding quarters or while they are confined during periods of cold, rainy weather after having enjoyed the freedom of the range.

Chicks that have had the liberty of the range may be quite restless and impatient upon being confined and the enforced idleness, with nothing to take their attention from each other, may breed such vices as feather picking and toe picking which may develop into the nore vicious forms of cannibalism.

Other Causes of Cannibalism

Other factors commonly advanced as contributing causes of cannibalism include overheating, excessive dryness in the brooding room irritating the skin, too much light, being left too long without feed in a well lighted room, chicks of different ages in one flock, irritation due to lice and mites, insufficient

Simple Mehods of Conrol The simplest and most effective control for cannibalism is to make it impossible for the chicks to dison night lights, if they are used. This also will reduce the amount of light in the room and will make it difficult for the chicks to distinguish such bright objects as their

If an outbreak of cannibalism occurs, the chicks that have been severly injured by picking should be removed until they have a chance to heal. A "stop-pick" repellent with a red color and disagreeable taste should be applied to the head. wings, and tail of about ten per cent of those remaining in the flock. This will break up the habit of picking anything that looks red. Factors which make the chicks nervous or irritable will aggravate outbreaks of cannibalism, and
