EDITORIAL

If Germany wins the war in Europe the United States will have isolation in fact instead of in theory.

Americanism is good enough for real Americans, but let us practice it instead of merely preaching about it.

The experts are still guessing about the war-so we will add our guess that Russia, if she enters the war, will fight on the side of the

Governor James, who wants Congress to remain in session to act as brake on the President against drifting into war, was very insistent in having the special session of his own Legislature adjourn in a hurry so that it could not act as a brake on the State's financial juggling.

Colonel Lindbergh's recent radio speech was that of a good flier, but that's all. How can he believe it makes no difference to the United States who wins the war in Europe? In fact, what does he mean in everything he said? He surely is not counting on that Nazi medal Hitler pinned on him for protection from these inhuman beasts abroad-or is he?

Regardless of how we define "neutrality," our country is face to face with an uncertain future. The United States must assume that the future interests of this nation will have to be defended by the army, navy and air force without assistance from any friendly power. Our policy of isolation assures this and, because we render no assistance to others, we have no reason to expect assistance from others. No man can tell what emands would be made upon this hemisphere in a world bereft of British and French influence and power but few men doubt that such demands would be made.

The Centre Democrat wishes to congratulate the students of our high schools who complete their courses this year and at the same time, to extend felicitations to those of this county who complete their college careers. The high schools of Centre county are graduating a fine grop of young men and women. Some of them will continue their education in higher channels, while others will not have the privilege. To the latter we say, they need accept no inferiority complex in regards to their classmates who study longer. They will find many opportunities to work cut the fullness of their existence, if they have the will to succeed. To one and all, may they play the game of life fairly, earning just rewards and rejoice in the similar success of their fellowmen.

Some of the experts are worrying about what will happen to the United States' \$19,000,000,000 hoarde if the European war changes the monetary system of the world. Bankers and economists in this country have expressed the opinion that the gold standard cannot operate if Germany and her allies win the war and dominate the future economic set-up of the world. While it is within the realm of possibility, in the event of a German victory, that gold will lose some of its importance in international trade, the disability will be temporary. In fact, we do not think that the United States need worry very much about having a worthless gold stock on hand. We might worry about the possibility of losing our gold stock if this nation is ever attacked by a coalition of powers, such as Germany, Italy and Japan, after the totalitarian states have conquered Europe

A tourist from another State let fall the remark the other day that it was a pleasure to note how business-like and gentlemanly were the Pennsylvania motor police. And he followed with an example of smartaleck wise-cracking indulged in by highway motor police in another State. In North Carolina, said our observing informant, a speeding motorist was overtaken by a motor cop and brought to a stop. "What do you think you are, an aviator?" demanded the cop, in a caustic voice. And without a word, the motorist, grinning, drew from his wallet an air pilot's license. "Okeh," said the cop, "you win, Go ahead-but don't let it happen again." Thus was the wise-cracking officer put in his place; and the business of promoting highway safety suffered. In Pennsylvania he found things entirely different. The process of patrol is a serious business conducted in dignity and politeness, which tends to promote for our motor laws.

We who stand at a safe distance and view the terrific speed and sweep of battle abroad, cannot hide our horror at the inhumane philosophy of the German Nazis. There is something indecent as well as brutal in the persistent propaganda fed to German women that their job is to have more and still more babies. The idea of being classed as livestock must be especially repulsive to womanhood no matter what their nationality. The whole thing is so hideous that Americans cannot stomach it. Mere thought of it is revolting along with that other fine bit of Nazi strategy which sends its apostles as guests into homes only to betray hospitality and entertainment. Interpreters of "Mein Kampf" assert that Hitler brands falsehood as a virtue and truth as a weakness. That makes easier to understand the vicious pretexts offered for invasions of Poland, Denmark, Norway and the Low Countries, namely, that the Allies were all set to occupy these nations when Germany decided to strike back. Lately there has come to light evidence that these German charges were based on utter untruth. In a big warehouse in Brussels, the Belgians found 50,060 pairs of German army boots, smuggled into the nation, probably by connivance of "fifth column" agents and long before Belgium was violated. Clearly the Nazis had designs on that country long ago. The boots proved it. All this testimony of Nazis' deception does not ease the blow of its mighty armies which at this hour are sweeping over Allied lands, but it does help obtain a necessary and of the nature of the forces which are deter

NO LIMIT TO NUMBER WISHING TO JOIN NAVY

Gum Stumy on Monday.

Bellefonte area, this week announced information on new recruiting instructions to be placed in effect immediately. Under the new order, the Navy

will abolish the system formerly in effect, assigning monthly quotas for this district. Now, all eligible applicants making application, will be enlisted shortly after making application regardless of number applying. Generally, the existing requirements will remain in effect. Applicants must be 18 years of age on date of enlistment, and must be morally, physically, and mentally fit, and must furnish satisfactory references. Also ex-members of the Army, Marine Corps and the Navy may be enfisted if discharged under honorable conditions and under 35 years of age.

Applicants on their first enlistment are ordered to the Newport Naval Training School for a two month training period after they are granted a leave period prior to receiving further orders for assignment to one of the Navy Trade schools or to one of the various units of the fleet.


