Penn State To Set New Record

Diplomas to be Awarded to About 1200 at Exercises Monday, June 10

An all-time high in number of graduates is expected at the commencement exercises of the Pennsylvania State College next Monday, June 10, when an estimated total of 1200 students will receive baccalaureate and advanced degrees. The previous record was set last June when 1157 diplomas were awarded.

William S. Hoffman, college registrar, revealed that approximately 130 candidates are expected to qualify for advanced degrees, perhaps as many as 20 of them earning the degree of doctor of philosophy. Three graduate students are candidates for doctor of education degrees.

The commencement exercises, to be held outdoors on the College athletic field if weather permits, will climax a busy weekend of graduation and alumni activities. Alumni Day will be observed on Saturday, June 8, and the Baccalaureate service will be held on the following day, with Dr. George A. Buttrick, pastor of Madison Avenue Presbyterian church, New York City, as the speaker.

Registration for the inter-session, first of the three summer sessions, will take place Tuesday, the day following graduation. The main summer session will extend from July 1 to August 9, and the post-session from August 12 to 30.
