HOW TO PREVENT BEES SWARMING

(Continued from page one)

given to a weak colony or used for making increase. The presence of large numbers of drones encourages swarming. Removal of comb containing drone cells and replacement with full sheets of foundation properly wired will correct the drone situation. Additional ventilation is needed during the swarming season. This can be provided by blocking up each corner of the hive about an inch from the bottom boards, Light shade boards on the hives will protect them from the direct rays of the sun. The boards should extend a few inches over the hive cover on all sides.
