A number of types of fever and many diseases are character-

ized by fairly definite types. For instance, in typhoid fever the temperature never gets normal during the entire 24 hours, after the disease gets under way, and the patient usually has a low pulse rate, considering the amount of temperature.

In malaria there may be "intermittent fever". The fever comes up on certain days and dissipates on others, caused by

the definite cycle of activity on the part of the malaria germ.

With tuberculosis the patient has a low grade of "remittent

fever", the type that is down in the morning and up in the

In pneumonia the fever is continuous, running at a relatively high level, usually coming on suddenly following a chill, and runs above 103 until the "crisis" passes. The suddenly disappearing fever is designated as the "crisis" type—the gradually diminishing, as the "lysis" type.
