Government Needs Mechanics Several hundred mechanics are needed for work in the national defense program. The United States Civil Service Commission announced today. The Frankford Arsenal in Philadelphia needs machinists, tool-makers, and instrument makers. Workers in a number of trades are needed also at the Philadelphia Navy Yard: boatbuilders, boiler-makers, calkers, and chippers (iron), coopersmiths, loftsmen, erecting fitters, aviation metalmiths, ship-fitters, and shipwrights. The Navy Yard could also use engineering assistants with experience or education on aeronautical work for employment in the Naval Aircraft Factory. Aircraft welders and aircraft radio electricians are needed at the Middletown Air Depot in Middletown, Pa. Applicants for most of the trades positions mentioned should have finished the recognized training period in the occupation for which they are applying. In most cases a four-year apprenticeship. Copies of the announcements and application forms may be secured from the Secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, at the post office in this city, or at any first or second-class post office.

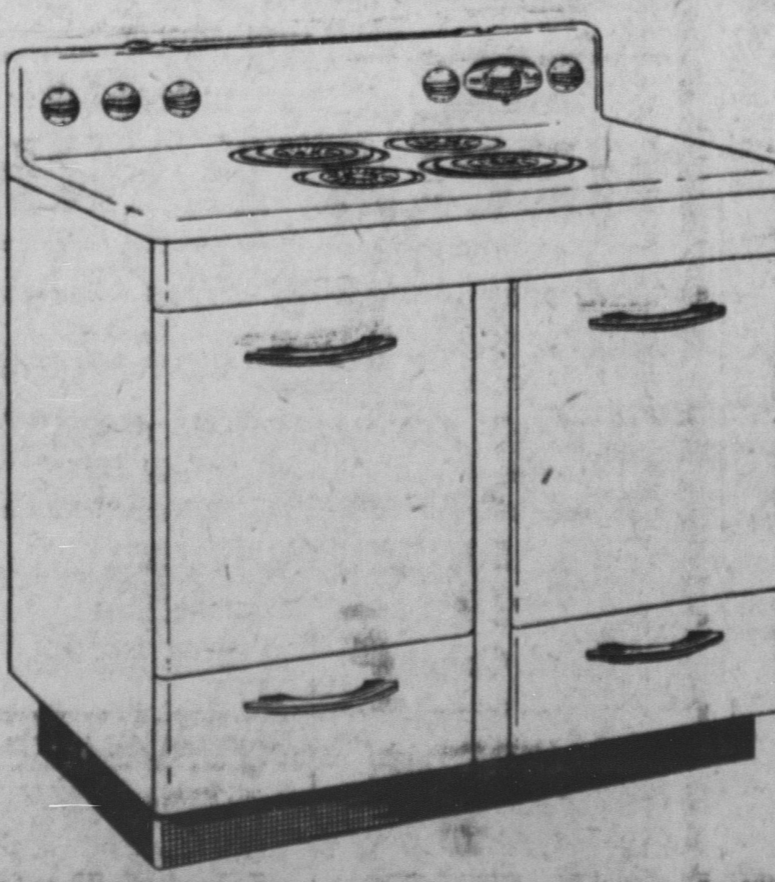
