Airport Opening Date Postponed

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This week will have to be delayed as the administration building is needed to house weather and other essential equipment.

While it was stated at Harrisburg that it would be several weeks before specifications are ready for bids, and a possible two months' time for erection after the contract is offered, it is understood that the method of financing the project is retarding its progress.

The full completion of the work, it is said, hangs in the balance today as the joint committee surveying Pennsylvania's air defense facilities awaits a justice department ruling on what departmental appropriations may be used for airport improvements.

Until this is decided no further funds will be available for completing the project.

Report 'Amazing' Find In Taylor Case

say that "the investigation looks more promising now than it has at any time in the 15 weeks since the murder."

Another of the "egg detectives" in the probe substantiated this belief but added with characteristic caution: "We're not building any air castles that might fall down on us."

Police freely admit that the Taylor murder comes as close to being a perfect crime as it is possible to conceive. Committed with apparent recklessness, and with little effort displayed to hide either the victim's body or possessions, the fact remains that the killer left practically no clues as to his identity and has succeeded in hiding his movements after the crime from police view.

Reliable rumors have it that the search in recent weeks has turned alternately to a Delaware community; to Altoona, and to the campus of the Pennsylvania State College.

One widely experienced police official commented yesterday to the effect that if evidence now being traced is borne out by the facts, the solution of the Taylor murder may

turn out to be almost unbelievably "fantastic."

In the absence of direct statements by the corps of highly trained detectives now devoting full time to the Taylor case from headquarters at the State College Hotel, State College, but judging from their general attitude regarding their findings, there is good reason to believe that police have information which they believe may soon bring the long-awaited "break" in Centre county's most bizarre murder mystery.
