Minor Operation

Boy Fractures Arm

The only July Fourth accident in the Bellefonte area claimed as its victim Richard Confer, aged 8, of Potters Mills. Richard broke his left arm between the elbow and shoulder when he fell out of a cherry tree. He was brought to the Centre County Hospital for treatment.
