OBSERVES EIGHTIETH BIRTHDAY ANNIVERSARY

Another of Centre County's residents to reach the coveted octogenarian mark is Harvey D. Hagan, of Farmer's Mills, who celebrated his eightieth birthday, August 1.

He has been a life-long resident of Farmer's Mills, the son of John Hagan, who came to America from Germany in 1830 and settled in Baltimore, Md., and Rebecca White-leather Hagan also of Baltimore.

In 1880 at the age of twenty, Mr. Hagan began the occupation of carpentering and continued in this same trade until his retirement in 1924.

In 1889 he married Alice Neese whose death in 1897 left him with one son, Gross Calvin Hagan, now living in Philadelphia.

In 1902 he married Gertrude Wise. To this marriage Mr. Hagan has two children, Mrs. Ardell Myers of Spring Mills and Ralph Myers of Centre Hall. He also has seven grandchildren.

Mr. Hagan has two brothers, Jacob and John, twins, and one sister, Jacob and the sister died young but John died in 1937 at the age of 82.

The home where Mr. Hagan now lives he purchased from Cyrus Lucas in 1890 when he began housekeeping and has lived there ever since.
