

South Boro Would Join Philipsburg

Asks Councilmen to Consider Annexing Smaller Town

In a formal request by Zeke Gilham, burgess of South Philipsburg, councilmen of Philipsburg borough are asked to consider annexing the smaller borough as a part of Philipsburg proper.

Mr. Gilham stated that one of the advantages in consolidation would be more efficient government of both boroughs at less individual expense. He also pointed out that South Philipsburg children would also have the advantages of a more advanced school system. The proposal was discussed at some length at Monday night's meeting of Council but the members came to no decision.

Councilmen, it is reported, see no way in which Philipsburg borough would be benefited by this enlargement. It is pointed out that the neighboring borough of more than 800 persons does not have paved streets, consistent sidewalks, or a sewerage system. Councilmen also view with disfavor South Philipsburg's present indebtedness, and the possibility that an increase in population might eventually change the classification of the borough and cut down the school appropriation.

D., and an outstanding student in the field of vocational agriculture at the Lock Haven High school, from which he was graduated this spring, has been awarded the Sears Roebuck scholarship of \$100 for four years' study at the Pennsylvania State College.

Ralph plans to enter Penn State in the fall and to study agriculture with the idea of becoming a vocational agriculture supervisor.

A member of the Future Farmers of America, Ralph stood high in class ranking at the Lock Haven High school, and has done good work with his special projects in sheep in connection with his vocational agriculture course.

He recently won third place in general livestock judging at the F. F. A. judging contest at State College, and if he repeats this feat in the fall will be eligible to go to Kansas City to represent Pennsylvania in the national F. F. A. judging contest.

The scholarship was awarded to Ralph on the basis of his scholarship rating and recommendations sent to the college by his local instructors and county agriculture leaders. Ralph was one of 30 Pennsylvania boys to receive the award.


