

Expect Court Decision On Millinder Hearing

The "real evidence" Harvey sought from the Commonwealth is material collected through the initiative and work of police agencies, and that the Court would have to be shown why the defense should be given the benefit of the Commonwealth's work before the trial.

Harvey's petition listed the following items which he wished to inspect before the trial; the stone or rock believed to have been used in bludgeoning Faye Gates to death on the Spook Hollow road near Mt. Eagle, May 5; mounds of footprints taken at and near the scene of the crime; fingerprints taken from the Faye Gates sedan; fingerprints taken from the death rock; and photographs showing the scene of the crime, footprints about the area and photos showing the condition of the slain girl's body.

Harvey's contention in asking for the evidence was that since some of it may require expert study in order to present the defense case to the jury here in September, he should have the opportunity to scan the items, call in experts if necessary, and so prepare his case. He admitted that he does not know the items listed in the petition.

On the Commonwealth side, District Attorney Gettig claimed that under the law a defendant is entitled only to know the nature and cause of an accusation against him. The prosecution is not required to give details whereby it expects to prove its case, he claimed. "At the trial," Gettig said, "the Commonwealth may be surprised by defense testimony. Surely, the State should not be expected to show its entire hand before trial!"

Attorney Harvey, in supporting his side of the picture, asked: "Suppose during the trial a rock is introduced as the death weapon? I have no way of proving it didn't kill her. I have no pictures of the wounds which caused her death? Continuing, he asked: 'Could we be certain that the body exhumed for a thorough study of the wounds, but I believe pictures in custody of the Commonwealth would serve the same purpose.'

Harvey cited one case in Pennsylvania courts where a defendant in a murder case asked for a pre-trial examination of evidence. In that case, he said, certain evidence consisting of three bullet wounds which were alleged to have caused death, was turned over to the defense for expert examination before trial.

The District Attorney cited numerous cases in which the courts throughout the United States have refused to turn over to defense counsel evidence the prosecution has obtained in murder cases.

Court Hears 6 Guilty Pleas

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quarts of whiskey and some beer from the Undine Fire house on East Bishop Street, July 27, was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution and undergo imprisonment in the county jail for three months.

In passing sentence the Court indicated that leniency was being shown despite recommendation to the contrary from "many people." O'Leary, formally charged with burglary, was arrested by Bellefonte Borough Officer Donald Johnson when a search of the O'Leary home revealed the missing liquor. Johnson said police had numerous similar complaints against the man, but that no evidence could be obtained on the previous thefts.

James Arthur Role, of State College, who in 1937 was placed under probation on a larceny charge, appeared in court charged with the larceny of 2 gallons of gasoline from the Dewey Krumrine distributing plant near State College, July 15.

John R. Juba, State College police chief and prosecutor in the case said that when Role was picked up on suspicion he claimed his car was in a garage, being overhauled. Officers, however, found his parked car nearby and discovered cans and a siphon hose in a compartment in the machine. Juba said many complaints of gasoline thefts have been received in State College in recent weeks. Role was sentenced to pay the costs and serve an indeterminate term in the State Industrial School at Huntingdon.

James Mansell, of Bellefonte, D. I., pleading guilty to a charge of drunk driving, was sentenced to pay the costs, a fine of \$100, and undergo ten days in jail.

The prosecutor, Pvt. George Finkbeiner, of the State Motor Police at Pleasant Gap, said he was patrolling the Snow Shoe road about 6:50 p. m. on July 21, when he saw a car zig-zagging toward him. Stopping the machine, Finkbeiner said the driver, Mansell, appeared intoxicated and was brought to a Bellefonte physician's office for examination. He was pronounced under the influence of alcohol, and unfit to drive a car, the officer said.

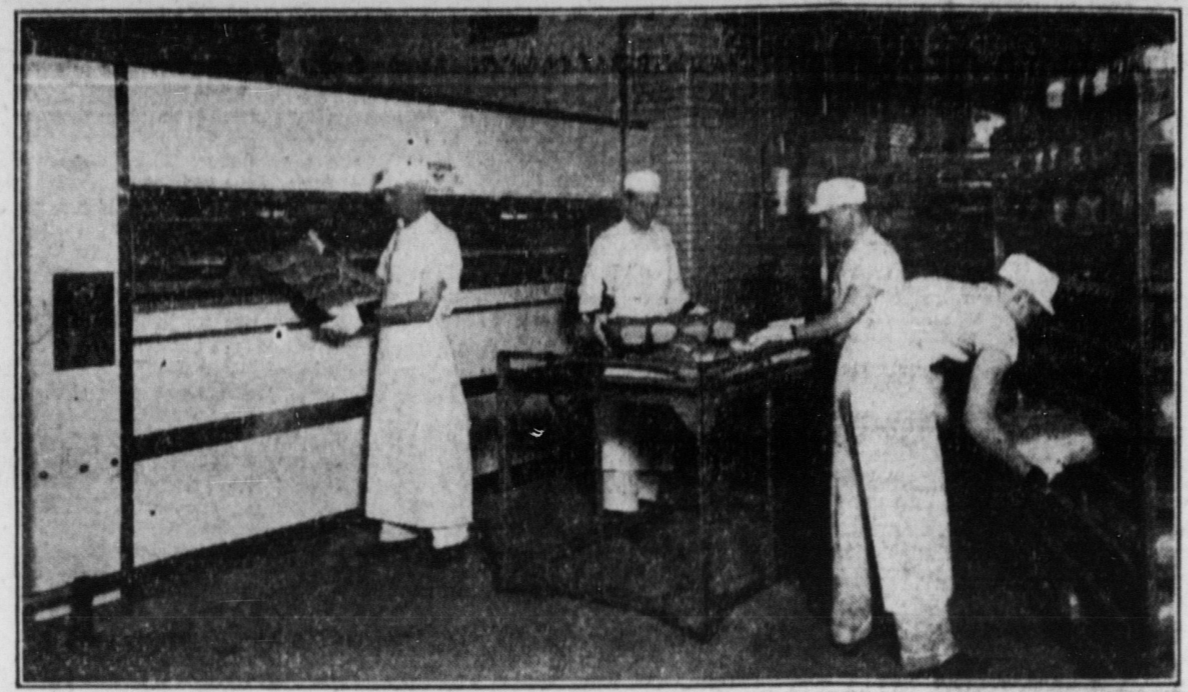
Leroy Lynn, of Julian, pleaded guilty to drunken driving, and Charles T. Ross, also of Julian, pleaded guilty to a charge of perverting the course of justice while intoxicated. Lynn was sentenced to pay the costs and serve 30 days in jail, and Ross was sentenced to pay the costs and serve 10 days in jail.

The prosecutor in the case was Officer Finkbeiner who said he stopped the Ross car on the Pleasant Gap road July 13 after an Oak Hall resident complained that the machine had crowded him off the road.

Finkbeiner said Lynn, the operator, was pronounced intoxicated by a Bellefonte physician, Ross, owner of the car, was sitting in the front seat beside Lynn.

In court, Ross, the owner of the car, said he'd had several drinks on the day of the arrest, and that he didn't know Lynn was intoxicated or he wouldn't have permitted him to drive.

623,897 ALLOCATED FOR FARM PURCHASES The Farm Security Administration has allocated the sum of \$623,897 to Pennsylvania this year for the Tenant Purchase Program, according to Oakley S. Havens, Farm Security Administration Supervisor in Blair and Centre counties. This amount, which is expected to permit the making of loans to 105 farm families for the purchase of farms, is the state's share of the fourth annual Congressional appropriation to carry out the provisions of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act.

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has become so badly worn that it will no longer draw water from any source excepting fire plugs. Wear also has reduced its pumping efficiency. Estimated cost of rebuilding, including replacement of all worn parts, will not exceed \$750, it was reported. The bill may be considerably less than that, it was indicated.

J. L. Tressel, of East Bishop street, former State Policeman, submitted an application for the position of Chief of Police and Health Officer for Bellefonte. The application, stating his qualifications for both positions, was tabled for future reference.

Conciliator Henry Brockerhoff reported that S. M. Shallock, superintendent of the American Lame and Stone Company, declared that a lime dust collector installed at the plant several months ago has practically eliminated the lime dust nuisance in Bellefonte during the daytime, but that considerable dust is freed at night. Mr. Shallock expressed the opinion, Brockerhoff said, that the lime is picked up by steam at the plant, and is carried by the steam into the air.

A certified public accountant appeared in Council with a suggestion that the borough employ his firm to set up a permanent tax record, which would show at a glance all delinquent taxes owed by any individual or entered against any property. Under the present system, Brockerhoff said, the borough has no record of delinquent taxes, or of actions which may have been taken in an effort to collect such taxes. The borough secretary, he said, could keep the record up to date after the system was set-up. He expressed the hope that the school board would set up a similar system, and disclosed that the total cost of the work would be \$375 for the borough and a similar amount for the school district. The matter was referred to the finance committee, water committee and borough solicitor. In connection with the tax problem, Council passed a motion instructing the solicitor to inform the Borough Tax Collector that Council demands a monthly report from the tax collector, as required by Pennsylvania law. The solicitor is to inform the official what information is to be contained in each monthly report.

Council passed an ordinance calling for the assessment of property owners residing in a long Dunlop, Spry and Burnside streets to help defray the cost of paving those streets. The assessment will amount to one third of the cost of construction.

The solicitor was instructed to inform the A. & P. super market management that unless proper supervision of parking is maintained around that building, the sidewalk driveways leading into the parking spaces will be closed.

Chief of Police Harry Dukeman's report of police activities revealed that 49 cars were tagged for parking violations; 7 investigations were made; 2 larceny cases were prosecuted; 2 suspicious characters were arrested; 9 transients were overnight guests at the lockup; 5 were arrested for drunkenness, and one arrest was made for burglary. Owners of defective sidewalks in Bellefonte are to be officially notified to have repairs made within ten days from the date of receiving the notice. If the property owners do not comply, the borough will make such repairs, and bill the owners for labor and materials, plus ten per cent extra as a penalty. Under the WPA sidewalk and curb building program which is to get under way soon in the borough, sidewalks and curbs can be built with a minimum of cost—the only charge to the owner being for materials.

HOUSEHOLD SCRAPBOOK

Window Cleaning Without Water Cloths for cleaning windows without use of water can be made with a semi-liquid paste of benzene and calcined magnesite. The cloth, which should be coarse linen or something free from lint, is dipped into this mixture and hung in the air until the spirits have evaporated and it is free from odor. This cloth may be used again and again and is a great convenience. When soiled, wash and redip.

Banana Dessert A delicious dessert can be prepared with baked sliced bananas, spread with honey and a few chopped nuts. Serve cold or hot. A recommended addition to this is lemon or orange sauce.

Increases Toughness If it is desired to increase the toughness of plaster of paris, dissolve in the water with which the plaster is to be mixed from 1/4 to 4 ounces of white or yellow dextrine or gum acacia.

Stucco Wash A good stucco wash can be made by stirring Portland cement into water until the consistency of an oil paint is obtained. Two per cent of calcium chloride by weight of the cement may also be added generally with advantage. Apply this paint with a stiff brush, or it may be sprayed on the walls.

Paraffin Paraffin that is left over after putting on jelly, can be removed from the container by filling the pan with boiling water and allowing to cool. The paraffin will float on the surface of water and will be easy to remove.

Wilted String Beans Wilted string beans, or other green vegetables, can be freshened if soaked for an hour in cold water, to which a couple of tablespoons of vinegar have been added.

Warm Weather Chocolate If the chocolate has acquired a white appearance on the outside this is merely a sign that it has become too warm and a little of the fat has melted and come to the surface. The chocolate in itself has not been affected and has no been injured in any way.

China and Glass China and glass can be toughened by placing the new articles in cold water and slowly bringing to a boil. Allow it to boil for three or four hours and then let stand until cool. If this is done, hot water will never crack it.
