MRS. MARGARET A. BLAIR

Mrs. Margaret Ann Blair died at her home in Tyrone on Saturday morning at 5:45 o'clock following several weeks' illness from complications. Mrs. Blair was a daughter of Hiram and Eliza Jones and was born at Shingletown, Centre county, November 26, 1864. In 1887, at Bellefonte, she was united in marriage with John C. Blair. She is survived by her husband and three children: Mrs. Charles Dodson, Tyrone; Mrs. Ray Harpster, Juniata; Miss Helen Blair, Altoona; Mrs. Charles Shively, Altoona; Lester Blair, Sayre; James Blair, Pittsburgh; also 16 grandchildren and two great grandchildren. She was a member of the First Pentecostal church of Tyrone.

MALCOLM ERNEST PLETCHER

Malcolm Ernest Pletcher, 27, former clerk at the Pletcher restaurant at Howard, died at 3 o'clock Sunday morning, August 4, 1940, at the home of his parents, Lewis and Amber Neff Pletcher, of Howard, R. D. after a five years' illness with a complication of diseases. He had undergone treatment at the Mt. Alto and Cresson sanitariums. The deceased was born in Howard township on June 15, 1913, making his age at time of death 27 years, 1 month and 19 days. He is survived by his parents and three brothers and sisters: Nathaniel, Betty, Robert, Silvia and Thomas, all at home. He was a graduate of the Howard High school and a member of the Evangelical church at Howard. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the Howard Evangelical church, with the Rev. L. E. Kline officiating. Interment was made in the Schenck cemetery, Howard. Casket-bearers were members of the deceased's graduating class at the Howard High school.

HARRY LEE McCLOSKEY

Harry Lee McCloskey, well known Beech Creek farmer, died at 8 o'clock Saturday morning, August 3, 1940, at the Lock Haven Hospital after a brief illness with a complication of diseases. Mr. McCloskey, who conducted a potato farm at Beech Creek, became unconscious and was rushed to the hospital, where he died without regaining consciousness. He was a son of Abner and Abigail Mason McCloskey and was born at Beech Creek on November 2, 1865, making his age at time of death 74 years, 8 months and 27 days. His wife preceded him in death. Survivors include two children: Glenn, of Beech Creek, and Rev. Nevin McCloskey, of Harrisburg, and a sister, Mrs. Daniel Gleason, of Lock Haven. He was a member of the Methodist church, the P. O. S. of A. and the Odd Fellows lodge, all of Beech Creek. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Neff Funeral Home in Tyrone with the Rev. Robert Plock of Port Matilda, officiating. Interment was made in the Hayes-Feston cemetery, near Beech Creek.

HORACE HASTINGS HUBBARD

Horace Hastings Hubbard, 72, of Beech Creek, died in the Lock Haven Hospital Wednesday afternoon, July 31, after an illness of three months. He had made his home in Beech Creek for the past 18 years, following the carpenter's and builder's trade. Mr. Hubbard was born June 1, 1868, a son of the late Joseph W. and Harriet Hubbard. He was a namesake of Daniel Hastings, one-time governor of Pennsylvania. As a young man, Governor Hastings was a member of the Hubbard household while teaching his first term as a 17-year-old teacher in Clinton county, at the time of Horace H. Hubbard's birth. In addition to a brother, Graffius H. Hubbard,

of Lock Haven, Mr. Hubbard is survived by a sister, Mrs. Priscilla Cunningham, of Clearfield, and a half-sister, Charlotte Hubbard, of Jersey Shore. A number of nieces and nephews also survive. Funeral services were conducted in the Beech Creek Funeral Home at Beech Creek, Saturday afternoon, with the Rev. Ralph B. Davis, Pilgrim Holiness pastor, officiating, and burial made in the Fearon cemetery near Beech Creek.

DANIEL E. GROSS

Daniel E. Gross, native of Pottery Mills, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Robert Wagner in Lewistown, Thursday evening, August 1, 1940, at 9:40 o'clock, after an illness of five years. He had been bedfast for the last seven months. He was a son of the late William and Ellen Wian Gross and was 58 years old. Surviving are his wife, the former Mary Milton, and a son and two daughters, Virgil Gross, Mrs. Robert (Theima) Wagner, and Mrs. Donald (Inez) Eberts. Six grandchildren are living. Three brothers and a sister are survivors: Samuel Gross, Centre Hall; John Gross and Mrs. Laura Kuhns, widow of Elton Kuhns, State College; Clarence Gross, Towanda. Mr. Gross was formerly a member of Tyrone United Brethren in Christ church and of Marquette Lodge, Altoona. For seven and one-half years he was employed at The American Viscose Corporation in different departments. Funeral services were held at the daughter's home in Lewistown, Sunday afternoon, with interment in Mount Rock cemetery, this city.

and struck the corner of the Corman family garage.

The 15 by 30 foot building, anchored to its foundations with steel pins, was forced nearly a foot from the foundations, a rafter was broken and the structure was twisted so that the doors would not open. The man and his grandson, standing near the corner which was struck, leaped aside when the car came together.

A woman passenger in the New York machine suffered a slight laceration of the forehead, and the car was badly damaged. The Ohio machine was only slightly damaged.

Pilot Badly Hurt In Plane Crash

Lutz to take charge.

When Lutz attempted to navigate the plane again he found the controls jammed, it was said, and the ship nose over to begin its plunge. Persons in the vicinity said the motor was cut off, then on, then off again before the plane crashed into the orchard.

Neyhart was thrown clear of the cabin and was found lying beside the plane by John Stoner, on whose farm the ship came down. Lutz with safety belt fastened, was jammed in the seat with his head forced between his knees. Stover cut the belt and pulled the unconscious man from the wreckage.

Caddies and golfers at the Centre Hills Country Club joined members of the Stoner family in rendering what aid they could to the two injured men, and State College physicians summoned from the country club, administered first aid. Lutz was rushed to the hospital here in the Koch ambulance, while Neyhart was brought to the institution in the Hospital ambulance dispatched to the scene a short time after the crash.

While there were apparently no eye-witnesses to the accident a number of persons heard the crash. An inspection of the demolished plane revealed that the ignition switch had been shut off, which probably accounted for the fact that the plane did not catch on fire. In falling the plane cut a swath through the orchard and landed on its nose. The motor was forced back into the cabin and was only a few inches from the seat. Neyhart had been occupying the wing and fuselage of the plane were badly twisted and broken.

After the crash, a guard was thrown about the plane and it was to be preserved intact until the arrival of a Federal inspector from Pittsburgh yesterday afternoon. It could not be learned whether this was a routine procedure, or whether there are some unusual factors about the crash which made such an inspection desirable. Attendants at the College Airport declined to comment on the cause of the accident until after the inspector has made his report. They declared it to be "their belief that some part of the control mechanism failed."

Lutz has had more than 6000 hours of flying time and is recognized as one of the ablest pilots in this section. More than 300 persons who learned to fly under his instruction have been granted licenses to date.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Lutz, of Buffalo Run Valley, west of Bellefonte, he quit school after completing his first year in the Bellefonte High School, and after working for several years for the Beauty Motor Company, Bellefonte and the State College Motor Company, enrolled in the Michigan State Auto School, completing his course there he returned to Centre County. He became interested in aviation more than 12 years ago when he piloted a plane taking passengers for short rides in the State College area engaged him to repair a balky motor. A ride given by the pilot in part payment of the repair job gave Lutz his start on what has become a successful career in aviation.

For a time he was employed as a flying instructor at Gettysburg, but since 1931 he has been operating the State College airport and for some time has been flying instructor in charge of the Civil Aeronautics Authority Civilian Training course being carried on with the co-operation of the government and the College.

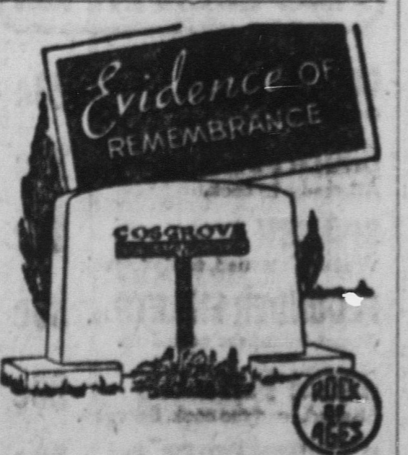

Congressman James E. VanZandt, Altoona, Republican, has identified himself with a movement of a group of present and past officers of four major veterans organizations to support Wendell L. Willkie, Republican presidential nominee.

VanZandt went to Chicago from Washington Sunday to appear before a mass meeting addressed by Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, under the auspices of the "Citizens' Keep America Out of War Committee."
