CRISP TASTY PICKLES STAND IN HIGH FAVOR

Sweet spicy odors soon will be floating through the air indicating that Centre county homemakers are in the midst of pickle making. There's nothing quite as tantalizing to the appetite as a good tasty pickle. What is a good pickle? One that is crisp, has a good color, and an agreeable taste, according to Miss Helen S. Butler, home economics extension representative of Centre county. If preserved whole, the pickle should have a solid center. Liquid on pickles should be clear and free from scum. Sometimes pickles fail to meet these requirements. There are several reasons for failures but all can be avoided. You can prevent hollow pickles if you put cucumbers in brine shortly after picking. Less than 24 hours is the most desirable time. If you use "floaters," cucumbers which have not developed perfectly and are hollow, you most likely will get hollow pickles. Maybe you're troubled with soft or slippery pickles. These result if the brine is too weak to stop the action of spoilage bacteria. If pickles are not covered with brine, they become soft and slippery. Weighting
