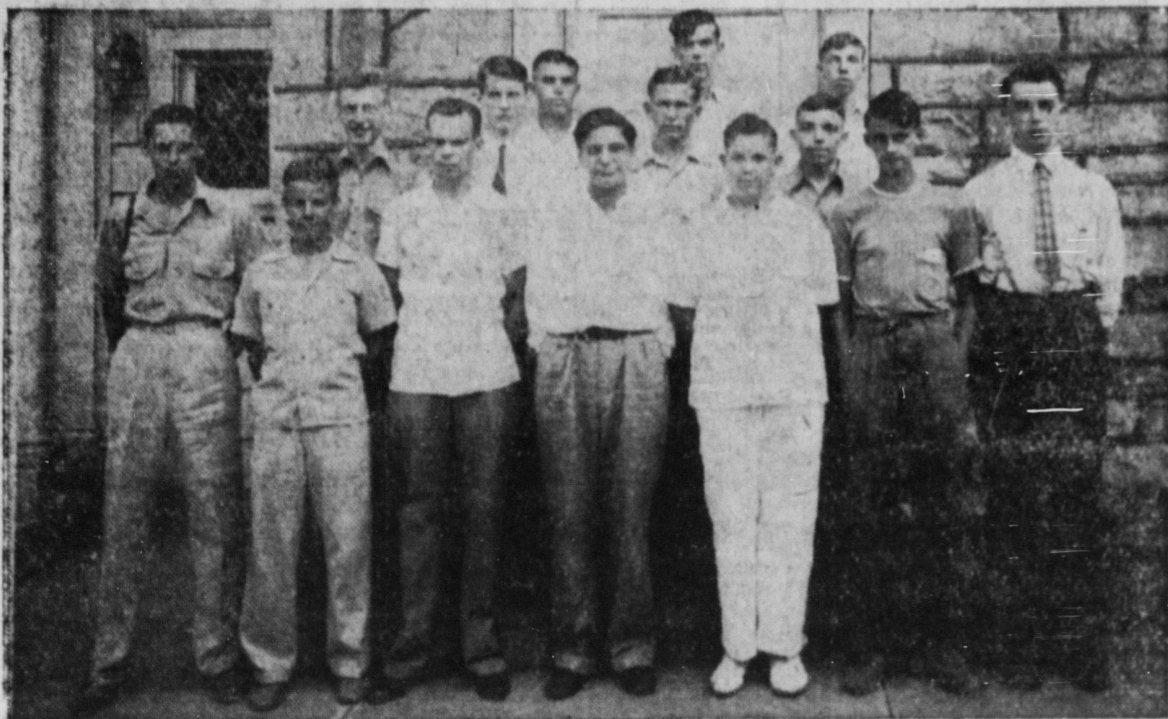


ATTEND LEGION CAMP AT INDIANTOWN

Townships To Receive Funds

Money Allocated on Mileage Basis Under 1939 Assembly Ruling

The second class townships of Centre county will receive \$10,977.97 on September 1, from the motor fund. This will be the first quarterly installment to be paid during the year as a result of legislation adopted by the 1939 session of the General Assembly.

The 1939 session appropriated \$8,500,000 from the motor fund to be returned to the second-class townships of the Commonwealth during 1940 and 1941. The State Highway Department made the allocation of the fund to the townships on a mileage basis. Requisitions providing for the payment of the money were prepared by the Highway Department and have been sent to the fiscal departments where the checks are being written.

bruises of the chest, fracture of the right leg between the hip and the knee, and fracture of the left forearm, in addition to numerous minor lacerations and bruises.

His companion in the plane, Charles Neyhart, 16, of State College, is recovering nicely at the hospital from a fracture of the left leg and minor lacerations and bruises.

Federal and State inspectors dismantled the wrecked plane piece by piece and took control wires, pulleys, and other apparatus for further examination. They declined to comment on the probable cause for the plane's sudden nose-dive from a height of 1600 feet after a cruise of more than a half hour, but indicated that an official report in the matter may be released later.

Coleville Boy Injured Lloyd A. Searly, ten-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Grover A. Searly, of Coleville, underwent treatment at the hospital for injuries received last Thursday evening in a fall from a tree while playing near his home. He suffered torn ligaments of the right arm, lacerations under the arm, and a fracture of the left arm at the elbow. Several stitches were required to close the lacerations about the shoulder. Searly was injured when he attempted to hang on to a limb while falling. Clothing caught in the tree and prevented him from dropping to the ground. The youth suffered a serious knee injury last summer in an accident.

Suffers Nose Injury Wilmer S. Andrews, aged 19, of Bellefonte, R. D. 3, was treated at the hospital for abrasions of the nose suffered in a motor accident near Hecla Park, Friday night. The youth, a passenger in a car operated by Arthur Hartle, of Spring Creek, was injured when the machine was involved in a collision with one reportedly driven by Paul Poorman. Andrews was discharged from the hospital after undergoing treatment in the dispensary.

Driver Is Injured Eugene Page, 23, of Oak Hall, was admitted to the hospital Tuesday morning to undergo treatment for injuries received when his car hit a culvert on the Centre Hall mountain.

Page suffered a laceration of the right eye and one heel and bruises about the left side of the body. The car snapped off a 9-inch tree and the motor was found 20 feet from the machine. It was reported.

PINCHOT FAVORS DRAFT, SENDING SHIPS TO BRITISH

Former Governor Gifford Pinchot, quietly observing his 75th birthday at his home in Milford, Sunday re-

plied "I don't know" to the question whether he plans to return to active politics. In one of his few public statements in the past two years, the former governor expressed himself as "vigorously for a selective draft" and endorsed General John J. Pershing's proposal to send old U. S. destroyers to England.

Advocating the draft, Pinchot declared "There is no sense in following the example of the nations which were destroyed by their failure to prepare in time." General Pershing, he said, "is everlastingly right. Sixty old destroyers will defend America better in Europe than here. They should send them immediately."

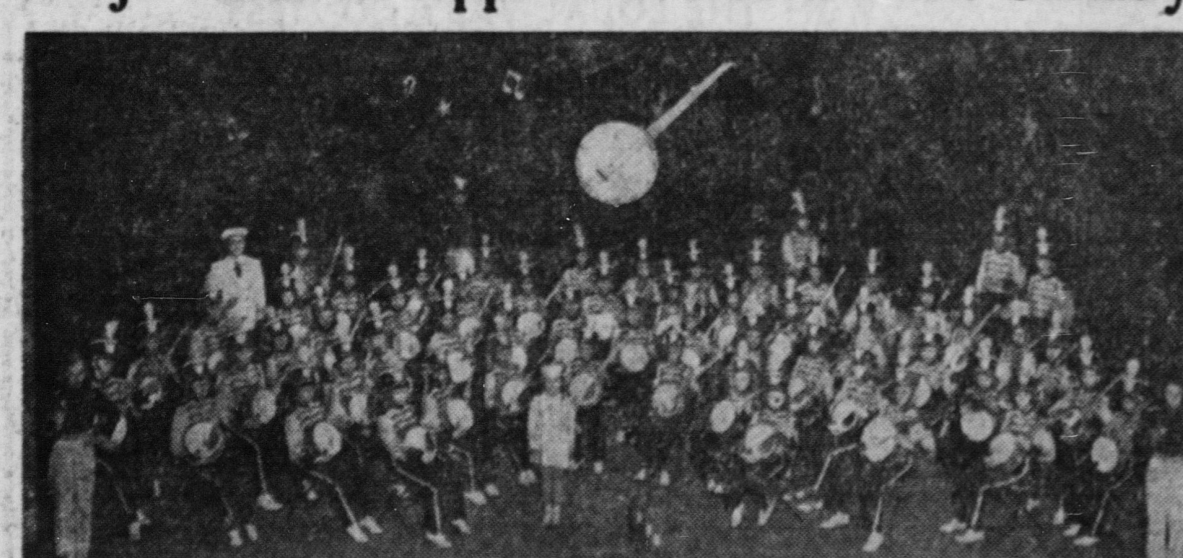
