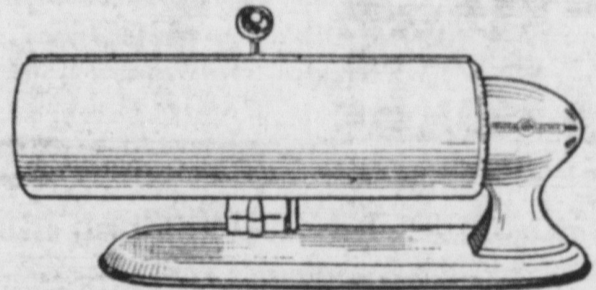

would total between \$200 and \$300. Ray McElroy, aged about 50, who gave his address as Everettville, W. Va., entered a plea of guilty to molesting a 9-year-old Bellefonte girl in the State theatre here on August 3. The formal charge was indecent assault.

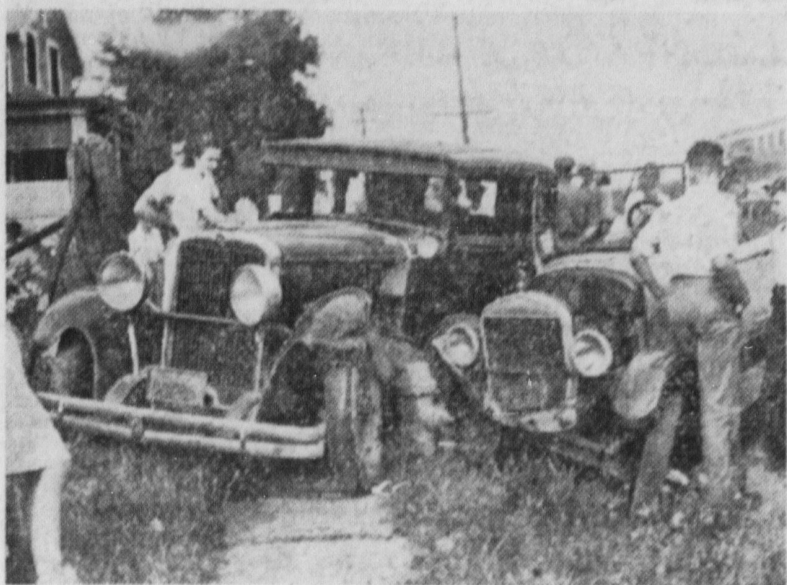
The prosecutor, Chief of Police Harry Dukeman, of Bellefonte, said the girl reported the man gave her chewing gum and a dime in the movie before he began his indecent acts. Later, the Chief said, McElroy took back the dime.

The defendant claimed he came to Bellefonte while on his way from Williamsport to Greenville. He said he can't work because of a crippled hand, and lives on compensation he receives. He was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$1, and undergo imprisonment in the county jail for three months.

Martin Luther Solt, aged 17, of Snow Shoe, entered a plea of guilty to an attempt to have sexual relations with a girl 13 years old. The offense allegedly took place near Spring Mills on June 8. The prosecutor, Pvt. Harold D. Ream, of the State Police at Rockview, said he was assigned to investigate the matter when the girl's parents reported she had contracted a disease. Ream added that Solt had admitted attempting a similar crime on an 11-year-old girl, and on a 9-year-old girl.

Solt, who did not accept the court's invitation to speak on his own behalf, was sentenced to serve an indeterminate term at the Huntingdon State Industrial School.

Cowher of East Bishop Street, who imposed a fine of \$10 plus \$2.50 costs on the reckless driving count, and a fine of \$5 and \$2.50 costs for failing to stop at the sign. The youth was released from custody after making arrangements to pay the penalties.
