Care of Aluminum Ware To remove discolorations from the inside of the aluminum ware fill the vessel with a cold weak solution of vinegar and water (1 tableconful to a quart), bring slowly to a boil, and let boil for five minutes Polish inside with the finest grade steel wool, and outside with sifted whiting applied with a damp piece of flannel or chamois, and occasionally with the steel wool.
